Proclamation To Deserters

P.C. 2814—Certified copy of a report of the Committee of the Privy Council, approved by His Excellency the Governor-General, of the 24th November, 1916.—652-17-22.

The Committee of the Privy Council have had before them a report, dated the 9th November, 1916, from the Minister of Militia and Defence, representing that many soldiers of the Canadian Overseas Expeditionary Force are absent from their units without leave. It is probable that the larger number of them did not, when leaving, appreciate the seriousness of their offence, and that they are now desirous of coming back, but fearing severe punishment, hesitate to do so.

Further, soldiers of the Expeditionary Force, now undergoing imprisonment for "Desertion" "Absence Without Leave" are available for service with the Force, if pardoned and released from

CLEMENCY GRANT ROYAL

The Minister, therefore, recommends, that your Excellency, as an act of grace, on assuming the

to such persons, by issuing a proclamation to the effect that those soldiers of the Expeditionary Force who are now absent without leave

BE PARDONED FOR SUCH OFFENCE

provided they surrender themselves to the Officer Commanding the unit to which they belonged, where that unit is still in Canada, or if it be not, to the District Officer Commanding any Military District in Canada.

NOT LATER THAN THE 15TH DAY OF DECEMBER, 1916.

for the purpose of completing their engagements; and that those soldiers of the said Force who are now under sentence of imprisonment or detention for desertion or absence without leave be pardoned for such offences, be released from imprisonment or detention, and be handed over to the Officer Commanding the unit to which they belong, or to the Officer Commanding the Military District in which they are, for the purpose of being returned to some other units of the Expeditionary Force, in order

to complete their engagements. The Committee concur in the foregoing recommendation and submit the same for approval.

EXODUS OF OFFICERS IS TO BE EXPECTED

Gen. Turner Likely to Cut Of Heads of Idle Cana-

Ottawa, Dec. 8.—It was authoritatively stated this morning that no distinction is to be made in England be tween members of Parliament and other Canadian officers in reducing the number of unemployed officers of higher rank now overseas. Any officer of higher rank than lieutenant who cannot get to France or whose services cannot be utilized in England

or France must resume civilian life. The appointment of Major-General Turner, V.C., to command the Canadian troops in England is expected to be followed by the ruthless lopping off of deadwood. He has been at the front since the beginning of the war, and will not tolerate the existence of men whose only claims to militarism are the wearing of uniform and drawing of the King's pay. The coming months will likely see an exodus from England back to Canada of scores of such officers.
