Saturday's Market.

Due to the rain and the prospects for a record Christmas market, there was only a small market Saturday. Eggs are still soaring, and the farmers do not even smile when they say, "Sixty cents a dozen." Butter sold from 45c to 48c a lb. and potatoes at \$2.50 a bag. Apples are scarce, and are selling at 50c a peck. A seven-pound turkey sold for \$2.50, and others from \$1.50 up to that price. Pork remains from 16c to 17c a lb.; beef, 19c to 11c a lb.; lamb, 18c to 20c a lb.; fowl, \$1 to \$1.25 a pair; chickens, 99c to \$1 a pair; and ducks from 70c to 99c each.
