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MRS. PECOR SOUNDS CALL FOR YOUNG MEN TO ENLIST AND GO OVERSEAS

She Points to Her Dead Husband as An Example—He Left Wife and Children to Fight For the Flag.

Mrs. Mary Pecor, 52 Place d'Armes, writes to the Whig as follows:

I hope you will find space in your paper for a short letter in regard to young men who should enlist. Young men, enlist, and do it at once. Don't think you are any better than your friends who have already fallen for the flag. I am mourning a good and loving husband and my ten children are left without a kind and good father. Still you young men are walking around with your hands in your pockets. Many of you laugh and scorn the soldiers who are good enough to lay down their lives if necessary for you and our country. How can you young men do this when you know you are needed?

It has been told to me that my husband was a fool but I hope that he has been settled in the other world. He did not think his life was too dear to give for the flag and the Empire. I remember him telling me he did not think the young men were enlisting as fast as he thought they should, so he said he would go, and then he thought the young men would see their duty.

Come you young men who are eligible and have no wife and family to keep you at home. You may have sweethearts, mothers, fathers, sisters and brothers but you should go and leave the many of you men at home with their wives and families. One life is as dear as any other. It is you young men who should go. Don't wait till this war is over and then say your were sorry you didn't go. Now is your chance. Enlist and do it now. I think my husband is a brave hero. Any young man who is eligible and does not go I say he is a coward and should be made enlist. He ought to be ashamed to be seen not in the khaki. Enlist now and save your country.

To The Memory of Pte. S. J. Creighton, Queen's Student.

In a book of poems by S. Rupert Broadfoot, Ottawa, one is dedicated by him to a friend, Pte. S. J. Creighton, P.P.C.L.I., who was killed at Ypres, June 2nd, 1916. In his memory Mr. Broadfoot has written the following:—

The Sad Christmas.

Your sons are sleeping in a Flanders trench.

At Ypres or on the bloody Somme, 'Twas yesterday you felt the wrench of parting—the Empire's call had come.

You know Gethsemane. You passed An age of waiting—hopes and fears— You saw them wounded, dying, gassed.

To you it seemed a hundred years. Their place is vacant. Christmastide This year brings not these Knights of Right.

They passed their Calvary—they died, Like Christ, to quell the hosts of night.

Ye Mothers, ye who bore our slain, Whose alien graves are o'er the sea, Behold your soldiers yonder reign As Princes with the Man of Galilee.

Stanley Creighton was principal of St. Malachi's School, Ottawa. He entered Queen's University to take an arts course, preparatory to studying law. When war broke out he joined the Princess Pats. He was an expert in the bomb throwing squad and on June 2nd had just returned from a successful raid on a German trench in high glee, bearing several trophies. He was climbing down into the Canadian trench when a high explosive shell killed him instantly.
