MILITARY CIRCLES

The substitution of vice-royalty for royalty at Ottawa brings with it a change in the details of military etiquette to judge by the paragraph published in local orders, which is substituted for that authorized in 1910 when H.R.H. the Duke of Connaught arrived. The new paragraph reads:

"On all occasions a guard of honor will receive his Excellency the Governor-General with a 'royal salute,' standards and colors lowered, officers saluting, men presenting arms, and bands playing the first six bars of the National Anthem. The King's color will be carried at the opening and prorogation of Parliament and other State ceremonies; on other occasions the regimental color."

Col. L. A. Roy, R.C.H.A., Kingston, inspected on Monday the Depot Artillery Brigade, Toronto, which is under the command of Lieut.-Col. Arnold. Every available horse and man was on parade. The inspection was made in order that General LeGue might know how the batteries were progressing with their training.

Lieut. W. G. McGinnis, Belleville, is dead in Montreal. He was a B.Sc. of Queen's University. He was with the Canadian Engineers and was at a training school at camp at St. John's, Quebec, superintending the building of trenches when he was taken seriously ill and conveyed to the hospital, Montreal. A delicate operation was necessary and from this he never rallied. Lieut. McGinnis was born in Belleville thirty-one years ago, a son of A. McGinnis, collector of customs.

In all probability instructional classes in drill and musketry for civilians will be started in the Armouries after New Year's by the officers of the 14th Regiment.

The 14th Regiment Guard is now comfortably located in their new barracks at Fort Henry. The new quarters are splendidly equipped for warmth and comfort, including shower baths. A piano has been placed in the Recreation Room.
