

First Favorites in Neckwear.



New collar designs featuring the tailored effects so much in vogue. Lace is daintily used, however, as shown on the collar with cuffs to match.

Here are some of the most favored designs in neckwear to wear with the separate blouse. The well-dressed woman no doubt has noticed that the majority of new offerings feature tailored effects with simple touches of hand embroidery or lace on them. Five different styles of collars are shown here, while an extra design includes cuffs to match. The material required for the various collars is as follows: No. 1, one-half yard; No 2, three-eighths yard; Nos. 3 and 5, fiveeighths yard each; No. 4, one yard; No. 6, five eighths yard, with 14 yards of edging. In all instances the material must be 36 inches wide.

The construction guide illustrates very plainly how each collar should be made. The first requires only to have the neck edge finished with a narrow band. This is also true of collar No. 3. To make the second model, join the two sections as notched, center-backs even and stitch on outside of collar, 1/2 inch from seem. Turn the upper part of collar underneath on line of small "o" perfora-


