Miss Olive Anderson's Brave Deed at the General Hospital.

HER LEFT HAND BEFORE SHI COULD WITHDRAW IT

After She Had Dragged Patient's Carriage Out of Danger-She Suffered Agony for Quarter of an Hour Before Hand Was Released.

Kingston General Hospital has a nurse-in-training who on Friday proved flerself a heroine. A patient was being wheeled into an elevator on a carriage, when through some blunder the elevator began to slowly move downwards. Miss Olive Anderson, of Lindsay, a junior nurse who was nearby, with great presence of mind, quickly pushed the carriage into the elevator, which came down ust a hairbreadth from the patient's nead. But before the brave nurse could withdraw her left hand the steel top of the door crushed down on it, and she suffered agonies for a quarter of an hour. Doctors, nurses and others worked

their hardest to get the elevator up an inch but it refused to budge. Fearing that the nurse's hand might be severed they had the cage supported with apparatus at hand. Finally the cage was forced up and the nurse was looked after by Dr. Mylks, who was present and assisted in the rescue. Other doctors responded and assisted Dr. Mylks in dressing he painful injuries received by Miss inderson whose hand will heal in

Doctors declare that Miss Anderson is a genuine heroine and a credit to the nursing profession. She thought only of the patient and took a daring chance when she pushed the carriage into cage at such terrible risk to herself. Miss Anderson is today the idol of the Kingston General Hospital, and the room in which she is resting is filled with flowers in recognition of her brave deed. She was to have left Saturday on a holiday, and met with her trying ordeal on the eve of an expected happy visit to her home.


