**NURSE SAVES PATIENT'S LIFE**

Miss Olive Anderson's Brave Deed at the General Hospital.

**ELEVATOR CAGE CRUSHED**

HER LEFT HAND BEFORE SHE COULD WITHDRAW IT

After She Had Dragged Patient's Carriage Out of Danger—She Suffered Agony for Quarter of an Hour Before Hand Was Released.

Kingston General Hospital has a nurse-in-training who on Friday proved herself a heroine. A patient was being wheeled into an elevator on a carriage, when through some blunder the elevator began to slowly move downwards. Miss Olive Anderson, of Lindsay, a junior nurse who was nearby, with great presence of mind, quickly pushed the carriage into the elevator, which came down just a hairbreadth from the patient's head. But before the brave nurse could withdraw her left hand the steel top of the door crushed down upon it, and she suffered agonies for a quarter of an hour.

Doctors, nurses and others worked their hardest to get the elevator up an inch but it refused to budge. Fearing that the nurse's hand might be severed they had the cage supported with apparatus at hand. Finally the cage was forced up and the nurse was looked after by Dr. Mylks, who was present and assisted in the rescue. Other doctors responded and assisted Dr. Mylks in dressing the painful injuries received by Miss Anderson whose hand will heal in due time.

Doctors declare that Miss Anderson is a genuine heroine and a credit to the nursing profession. She thought only of the patient and took a daring chance when she pushed the carriage into cage at such a terrible risk to herself. Miss Anderson is today the idol of the Kingston General Hospital, and the room in which she is resting is filled with flowers in recognition of her brave deed. She was to have left Saturday on a holiday, and met with her trying ordeal on the eve of an expected happy visit to her home.

**VETERAN CLERK RETIRES.**  
 J. W. Henstridge Has Long Served as Portsmouth's Clerk.



J. W. Henstridge, who is retiring as clerk of the Portsmouth Council, has seen twenty-eight years, in the municipal work of the village. He will be eighty-five years old, on Jan. 2nd, and although a good margin over his three score years and ten, he is in good health and it is the wish of his many friends, that he will be spared to enjoy many more years of good health and happiness.

Mr. Henstridge has lived in Portsmouth for thirty-nine years, and is perhaps one of the best-known residents. He has ever had the interests of the people at heart, and has done much to help on the good work. He has been serving as clerk for the past eleven years, but previous to this he was acting clerk, having to look after the duties of Mr. Kelly, during his absence. He was born in London, Eng., and came out to Canada early in life, first taking up his residence in Toronto. He was a bookbinder by trade, and worked at this in the old country, but when he came out to this country, he found very little to do in this line of business.

He resided in Frontenac county for some period after leaving Toronto and for a time was engaged as public school teacher at Crystal Springs. He served as a school trustee in Portsmouth, is a member of St. John's church, and formerly served as treasurer for this church. For many years he taught school in Portsmouth.

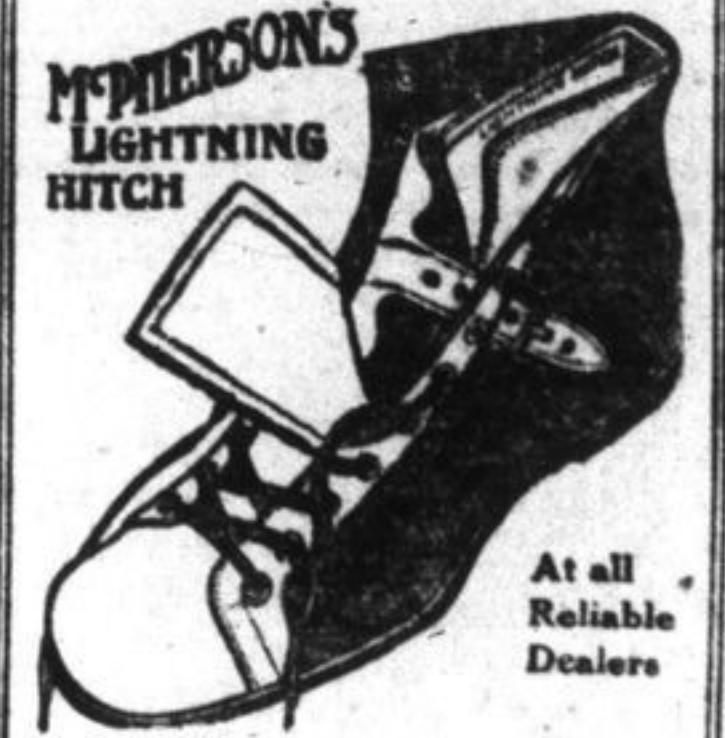

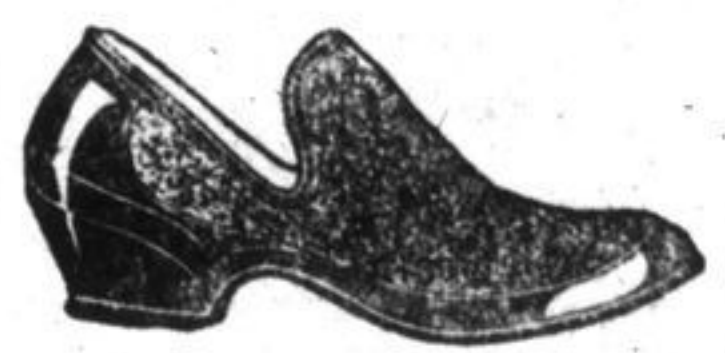
