DOESN'T BELIEVE IN BULLYING

Lieut.-Col. P. C. C. Campbell Has New Ideas on Recruiting.

PRIVILEGE TO JOIN 233RD

"ROUGH-NECKS" WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.

Col. Campbell Deprecates the Methods of Some Recruiting Officers—He Expects to Get a Goodly Number Around Ottawa.
"I tell the men who join with me that it is a privilege for them to enlist. I do not mean that they are privileged in joining the battalion because I happen to be the head of it. You know it is not every day that a man can join a Highland battalion," declared Lieut.-Col. P. C. Campbell, O.C. 253rd Battalion, to the Ottawa Free Press.

Col. Campbell is not in sympathy with the methods of recruiting that have been carried out in the past. "The time for bullying men to enlist is either past or has not come," said the colonel, "and I will not tolerate any bullying in my battalion."

"Are we going to have any special feature in our battalion?" That I won't say at present, but I will tell you that we will not accept rough necks for the 253rd."
Campbell said a company for the battalion was being raised in British Columbia, and that the Government is not asked to spend any money on the campaign, nor is the battalion. The company is being raised by Scotsmen, who have been attracted by the skill of the pipes and want to serve their country in some way.

The 253rd expects that Ottawa will contribute its quota. Recruiting all over the Dominion, and especially in the west, is very satisfactory to the officers.
Col. Campbell scored the methods of some officers who attend public gatherings and call the men in mufti shirkers, white-livered, etc. Although the 253rd has been conducting public meetings, the policy is not to mention enlisting until it is felt that the residents are in sympathy with the cause.

In a certain county in Ontario, recruiting officers have been met very coldly, but even in this frigid county Col. Campbell expects to "break through the ice and land his fish," according to the Free Press.

UNSELFISH SERVICES ARE RECOGNIZED
Miss Strange Presented With Gold Wrist Watch by Charity Circle.

An event of much interest took place last Wednesday morning at the home of Mrs. Campbell Strange, Barrie street, where an unusually large number of the Charity Circle of King's Daughters met for their monthly sewing, also to pay a tribute of affection and esteem to their popular leader, Miss G. Strange, who has been the head of the circle for the last twenty-five years, taking the place of Miss Florrie Britton at the time of her marriage.
The presentation of a very fine gold wrist watch was made by Mrs. D. G. McPhail in the name of many old and many new members in those twenty-five years. All realize the splendid unselfish work Miss Strange has done, but many do not know that the most helpful club, the Food and Fuel, owes its splendid success to the leader of this circle. From very small beginnings it now numbers about 206 families. The amount collected last year (about the same this) was \$1,274. There are eleven collectors in the Circle, who give service once a week for six or seven months in the year.
Outside of the membership of the King's Daughters are many who have appreciated the devoted, zealous work of Miss Strange, and rejoice that her quiet, unostentatious efforts have been so worthily recognized.
