RAID BY THE BEARS

Upon the Stocks on the New York Exchange.

(Special to the Whig) New York, Dec. 20.—A raid by bears on the stock market shortly after two o'clock this afternoon drove prices off two to nearly twelve points from the high quotations of the day. U.S. Steel broke to 108 1/4 under an avalanche of selling orders as compared with high to-day of 113. The Dow Jones Financial News ticker, in explaining the break, said the street had confidential reports that the administration will address to the belligerents "some suggestions or proposals in regard to peace" in the near future.

APPEALS FOR AID TO BLIND SOLDIERS

Sir Arthur Pearson Issues a Request for New Year Gift.

Ottawa, Dec. 20.—Sir Arthur Pearson makes the following appeal to the press of the world:

"I would request that you ask your readers to send a New Year's gift to help the men blinded in the war. Their numbers are increasing very rapidly. We have nearly 300 learning to be self-supporting, and nearly 200 more are coming shortly from the hospital. One hundred and sixty have already been taught to read Braille and to typewrite, and have been settled in useful and profitable occupations. A large permanent fund is needed to ensure adequate supervision and assistance for these and others who are to follow.

"The courage, determination and rapidly in overcoming the handicap of blindness shown by them is beyond all praise. Those possessing the inestimable gift of sight will send a new year thanks-offering for the benefit of those who have given their eyes for the empire."
