of stock for broth. Mix flour with cold water; when smooth add to meat and vegetables; bake in bakedish which has been lined with dough. Sprinkle meat with parsley and dust with paprika. Cover, brush top with milk and bake 35 to 40 minutes.

For the crust, 1 1/2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder, pinch of salt, a teaspoon of shortening is used and made as usual. The reason for using round steak is that there is no fat or waste and it takes less time to cook.

Apple Tapioca Pudding
 Materials—One quart apples, 1/2 cup granulated tapioca, 1 cup brown sugar, pinch of salt, 1 teaspoon butter.

Utensils—Knife, bakopan, 2 measuring cups, teaspoon, tablespoon, saucapan.

Directions—Wash, pare, quarter, and core the apples; brush pan with butter and place the apples on; sprinkle 1 tablespoon of sugar over the apples, put in hot oven and bake until tender. Place in glass or china bowl; pour over the tapioca, set aside to cool.

Tapioca—Put 4 cups of water or milk on to boil, add the tapioca slowly and boil 30 minutes. Add the sugar and salt, and water is needed. Dust with cinnamon or grated nutmeg if desired.

Beefsteak Pie with Vegetables.
 Materials—One pound round steak, 1 quart (4 cups) diced raw potatoes, 1 cup diced carrots, 1/2 cup cut onions, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 tablespoon finely cut parsley, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon paprika.

Utensils—Knife, 2 measuring cups, teaspoon, tablespoons, large saucapan, small bowl, bakedish, pastry brush, mixing bowl, rolling pin, bakboard.

Directions—The steak is cut in narrow strips, put in saucapan with potatoes, carrots, onions and seasoning, cover with 6 cups boiling water, boil 25 to 40 minutes, using 4 cups

RUMANIAN PARLIAMENT TO MEET IN PETROGRAD

Berlin Hears That King of Rumania Will Go to England.

Berlin, Dec. 19.—The correspondent at Stockholm of the Lokal Anzeiger telegraphs that during the meeting of the last Rumanian Crown Council it was resolved that the Rumanian foreign office should be transported to Petrograd, the other ministries for the present being established at Kiev. The Rumanian Parliament, it is reported, will meet at Petrograd. King Ferdinand is said to have declared that he would stay one week in Russia and then go to England.

The correspondent quotes Russian news despatches from Jassy, on the Russo-Rumanian frontier, as saying the Rumanian towns of Braila and Galatz, on the Danube, in south-eastern Moldavia, have been evacuated by the Rumanians.
