## WANTS TO RAISE 10,000 MORE

In Military District No. 3 Before the Spring  
of 1917.

### GEN. HEMMING'S APPEAL

HE IS SURE THE ABOVE NUMBER  
CAN BE RAISED.

Gives Good Advice to Officers to  
Hunt for Recruits—Will Remove  
Officers Who Neglect to Play the  
Game.

Brig-Gen. Hemming the General  
Officer Commanding Military  
District No. 3, writes as follows on re-  
cruiting:

"It is my ambition to raise in  
Military District No. 3, 10,000 men  
for all branches of the service be-  
fore the spring of 1917. To attain  
that I must impress upon all ranks  
the great necessity of united effort.  
I am of the opinion that Military  
District No. 3, can raise the above  
number provided we all work to-  
gether for the good of the service.  
It will require the greatest possible  
effort and untiring energy on the  
part of all, nothing must be left to  
chance. Officers who neglect to play  
the game to the very best of their  
ability will be removed without the  
slightest consideration.

"It must be remembered that a  
unit on organization is like a new  
hive of bees. The officers who are  
the first to be appointed represent  
the swarm who have been allotted  
a new hive and are responsible for  
the filling up of their unit during  
the season, otherwise they perish for  
want of nourishment.  
A good motto for all officers to

adopt and one that should always be  
kept fresh in the memory is:  
"The Bee that gathers the honey  
doesn't hang around the hive."  
"It is expected all officers will  
govern themselves accordingly and  
better results will follow."

### NATIONAL SERVICE CARDS

WILL BE GIVEN TO THE LETTER  
CARRIERS FOR DISTRIBUTION.

Machinery of the Post Office Depart-  
ment Has Been Secured to Co-oper-  
ate With the National Service  
Board of Canada.

Postmaster James Stewart has re-  
ceived word that he will be supplied  
with national service cards and ad-  
dressed envelopes sufficient for the  
estimated number of male persons be-  
tween the ages of 16 and 65, served  
by the Kingston Post Office. As soon  
as the cards arrive the postmaster  
will have the letter carriers distribute  
them throughout the city.

With a view to making a complete  
inventory of all the males in Canada  
between the ages already mentioned,  
the National Service Board of Canada  
has, in order to do this with undue  
waste of time, has asked the co-oper-  
ation of the machinery of the post  
office department. As a result of  
this, Postmaster-General Casgrain has  
sent out notices inviting every post-  
master and postmistress to use every  
means at his or her disposal to insure  
the complete success of the project  
and by so doing render service to the  
country at a moment of great national  
peril.

The cards will be distributed after  
the Christmas rush. As they are be-  
ing sent all over Canada, they should  
serve well the purpose for which they  
are intended. Teachers, lawyers,  
clergymen, and boy scouts too, are to  
be utilized in the work of getting the  
cards filled out.

### CONVICTS WILL SING AND HAVE A GOOD TIME

Arrangements Are Being Made  
For a Feast of Yuletide  
Music.

Arrangements are being made for  
the convicts at the penitentiary to  
hold their Christmas entertainment  
on Tuesday afternoon following  
Christmas. The convicts will make  
merry, and it is stated that an in-  
teresting programme will be pro-  
vided. Last year a gramophone was  
introduced as a new feature. It will  
be used again this year, and in ad-  
dition there will be violin music by  
some of the convicts, and the sing-  
ing of Christmas carols. The men  
have been practising, and it is stated  
that there are some very fine singers  
among the "birds."

The entertainment is not being  
held on Christmas Day owing to the  
fact that the majority of the guards  
will be off duty enjoying their Christ-  
mas festivities. The convicts will  
have their Christmas dinner on  
Christmas Day, the chief item on the  
bill of fare being roast pork.

### THE AXE IS FALLING IN MILITARY CIRCLES

Many Officers Are to Be Let  
Out—Economy the Watch-  
word.

Every day is bringing additions to  
the list of officers of this district who  
on New Year's Day will retire from  
soldier to civilian life. There have  
been three officers of high rank "let  
out" in the last three days, and of-  
ficers of lesser rank.

Since the war began many officers  
have been taken on various units in  
this military district. With orders  
from Ottawa that a house-cleaning  
was to be inaugurated throughout  
the country, the axe began to fall on  
many heads, and the Whig is told  
that it has not yet finished its work.

From now on the whole military  
system will be thoroughly impressed  
with the need for the most co-oper-  
ative and economic action, and officers  
not needed will be retired to civil  
life.

The British War Office is adopting  
the scheme, and it is spreading now  
to Canada, until in every case a man  
will have to earn his pay while he  
wears the uniform of the King.

### H. C. NICKLE TO ENTERTAIN

Ames for this performance. A bag  
of candies and an orange will be  
given to each one as they pass out  
of the building. Ald. Hugh C. Nickle  
has arranged this entertainment  
and anyone entitled to tickets will  
be given the same at his office. The  
convalescent soldiers are also to be  
invited.
