**300 SOLDIERS ENTERTAINED**  
BY THE CITIZENS IN THE MILITARY Y. M. C. A. HALL.  
On Christmas Night—A Splendid Programme Was Given—A Social Hour on Sunday Night.  
The gaily decorated rooms of the Military Y. M. C. A. hall presented a very pleasing spectacle on Christmas night, when 300 soldiers were magnificently entertained by the citizens of Kingston. Under the energetic management of Miss Foster, secretary of the Y. W. C. A., the soldiers were introduced to a number of novel and interesting games. The introduction of some competitive games proved to be an excellent method of getting acquainted. Lieut. Pearson, R.S.A., presented the prizes to the winners of the competitions. The games were followed by a splendid and appropriate musical programme. Miss Sutherland, Miss A. Parrott, Miss Foster each contributed solos, which were much appreciated. Miss Parrott, elocutionist, rendered some of her humorous sketches. After the programme had been presented, refreshments were served, including all sorts of appetizing dishes, supplemented by oranges and a box of cigarettes for each soldier.

While refreshments were being served Capt. Thomas Pearson, Military Y. M. C. A., read a message from Brig.-Gen. and Mrs. Hemming to all ranks, conveying their best wishes to them at this season of the year. A message was also read from Dr. John R. Mott, a prominent leader in Y. M. C. A. work, stating that through the generosity of certain Christian ladies who are interested in the work of the Y. M. C. A., \$700 had been given as a Christmas gift to the Y. M. C. A. movement. The men were deeply interested in these messages, and gave an outward demonstration of their appreciation. Through the kindness of Lieut. Col. and Mrs. W. H. Macnee a Victoria and records were placed at the disposal of the committee for entertainment. S. H. Greenslade, on behalf of the soldiers, thanked the citizens of Kingston for the magnificent way in which they had been entertained. At the close of the evening's programme Miss Burley led the men in choruses, after which one of the best social evenings was brought to a close. A very helpful and enjoyable social hour was spent at the Military Y. M. C. A. on Sunday evening. There were about 120 present. Capt. "Tom" Pearson took charge of the meeting. The choir of the Brock Street Methodist church, under the leadership of Miss Nesbitt, rendered excellent assistance in the song service. S. H. Greenslade led in prayer and Miss Foster, secretary of the Y. W. C. A., contributed much to the service by her work as soloist. The speaker of the evening was Bishop Bidwell. His practical and helpful remarks were quite appropriate to Christmas tide and were much appreciated.

**PROF. LANOS' COUSIN**  
**WRITES FROM ENGLAND**  
He is Missionary Priest and Teacher at Nonoute, Gilbert Islands.  
Rev. P. AUGUSTUS, missionary priest and teacher, writes as follows to his cousin, Prof. J. M. Lanos: "Nonoute, Gilbert Islands, July 25th, 1916.  
"Nonoute, my island, is one of a number of ring-shaped coral reefs enclosing a lagoon, which cluster near the Equator and make up the most easterly part of Micronesia. It is months before news can reach us. I just heard of the battle of Verdun and the success of the French arms. But I am not the only one to rejoice at the victory of the Allies; the natives, who are of Malay origin and type, who until the advent of the white man, less than a generation ago, were rivaled for savagery and cannibalism, rejoice also at the fallure of the Germans, and work hard gathering copra for the benefit of the entering. Four companies deal in this commodity, and employ many, in fact, all natives. The recruiting ship—Ocean Island, the recruiting office in a long while. How eagerly we rush to the landing, hoping to be told that the war is at an end. And yet, both my 'savages' and myself want nothing but a victorious ending of this massacre, and pray as earnestly for the defeat of Germany and for the downfall of Satan's power and tyranny over the souls of men."


**LATE REV. MOTHER POWERS**  
THE SUPERIOR OF THE HOTEL DIEU HOSPITAL.  
The burial took place on Tuesday morning. When Archbishop Spratt Celebrated Requiem Mass in the Convent Chapel.  
Early on Saturday morning in the midst of the hurra and anxiety of preparing for the great feast of Christmas, the Sisters of the Hotel Dieu suffered a keen sorrow in the death of their beloved Superior, Rev. Sister Powers. This devoted sister had been ill some time, but all felt that her restoration to health was at hand and that it was just a matter of a few days when she would be able to resume her duties of superintending. In this capacity she was serving her Community for the third term, which expresses louder than words the love and esteem her Sisters had for her.  
When Rev. George Corbett, V.G., Cornwall, requested Sisters from Kingston to found a hospital in that town, this self-sacrificing sister was one of the first to offer her services. In that new field of labor as well as in this her mother house, she was always an exemplary religious, always at her post of duty, filled with devotion and zeal to comfort and relieve all who came under her charge. Her sisters feel her death has left a void in their home, that time alone can partially efface.  
The deceased was a daughter of George Powers, Trenton, and entered the Hotel Dieu in 1888. She is survived by her mother, a sister, Mrs. John Finlan, and one brother, George Power, all of Trenton.  
In the convent chapel on Tuesday morning at 8.30 o'clock Archbishop Spratt celebrated solemn requiem mass for the repose of the deceased. The clergy assisting and present in the sanctuary were: Rev. J. P. Kehoe, Canonique; Rev. A. J. Hanley, rector of St. Mary's cathedral; Rev. C. A. Mea, city; Rev. F. Hyland, Belleville; Rev. R. Halligan, accompanied by St. Mary's choir boys, sang during the mass.  
The funeral was largely attended by her many friends, her immediate relatives all being present. The pallbearers were doctors W. A. McCarthy, R. Hanley, C. E. O'Connor, C. A. Morrison, W. Gibson and L. E. Crowley. The remains were placed in St. Mary's vault.
