**CLEARING ARTS BUILDING**

**OF CONTENTS BEFORE IT BECOMES A HOSPITAL.**  
Professors and Students Aid in the Work—Alterations, to the Building to be Started in a Few Days.  
The preliminary work of clearing the Arts building of furniture and books in preparation for the alterations that are to be made to it and Grant Hall, in converting the whole building into a large military hospital, was started on Thursday morning.

J. H. Sissons, president of the Arts Society, had appealed to a number of the students to aid in the work and a number were ready to do all in their power to help in transferring the articles.  
The professors were also on hand and both they and the students worked like brothers in removing the large quantities of books and furniture from the private rooms of the professors.

The work of clearing out the rooms will take several days, and it is expected that the work of renovating and altering the building will be started soon after.  
The professors are being given rooms in Ontario, Carruthers and Fleming halls in the buildings heretofore used by the Faculty of Applied Science.

The quarters are expected to prove very satisfactory and some of the departments from the Faculty of Arts are even getting better rooms than they had been before. However, the sacrifices that is being made is done so in the spirit that has always characterized both the staff and the students at Queen's, and everyone in the University is confident that the sacrifices will bring a feeling of pride that something has been done, however small, to aid the sacred cause.

**Sand Hill Red Cross.**  
The final meeting of the Sand Hill Red Cross workers was held in the basement of the church, Dec. 21st. The report was very encouraging, as the ladies have only been working for half a year. Ten cent teas were given once a month during the summer months, \$22.35 being realized. The Ladies' Aid Society donated \$25 to Red Cross from their June social, making a total of \$4,735. The actual work accomplished was as follows: 53 pair knitted socks, 17 pair operation socks, 62 hospital shirts, 7 army shirts, 112 towels, 68 abdominal bandages, 6 dental coats, 20 pads, 8 suits pajamas.

**PRODUCTION OF MUNITIONS**

**TENANT PAID A FINE**  
**BECAUSE SHE KICKED A HOLE IN THE FRONT DOOR.**  
Man Who Operated Slaughter House Which Had Been Condemned by the Board of Health Was Also Called Upon to Pay a Fine.  
Because she kicked a hole in the front door of her home at 35 Elm street, when she found the door locked, Mrs. Mary Ackley was fined \$2 and costs in police court on Thursday morning.

The owner of the house, Dennis Richardson, charged Mrs. Ackley with damage to property, and C. E. Webster conducted the prosecution. D. A. Givens appeared for Mrs. Ackley. The latter admitted kicking at the door, but stated that she did not do so with the intention of doing any harm.  
Two families occupy the house, which is located at 35 Elm street, and from the evidence it was shown that the door had been locked unawares to Mrs. Ackley.  
Thomas McGuire was fined \$5 and costs because he operated a slaughter house at Williamsville which had been condemned by the Board of Health. Inspector Nicholas Timmerman laid the charge, and the accused pleaded guilty. The slaughter house was closed a couple of years ago by the Board of Health.
