MANIFESTO TO MARK BIRTHDAY OF KAISER

Enemy Rulers to Join in Barring Entente for War's Continuance.
 London, Jan. 15.—It is reported by the Amsterdam correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company that on the occasion of Emperor William's forthcoming birthday he will be fifty-eight years of age on Jan. 27th. Emperor Charles of Austria-Hungary, King Ferdinand of Bulgaria and the Turkish heir-apparent will go to Berlin to attend the birthday celebrations, and that while they are there the three rulers and the Turkish representative will issue a manifesto to the world, placing responsibility on the Entente for continuation of the war. The Sultan of Turkey will not attend the celebration on account of his advanced years.

CHINA CONTRACTS FOR RAILWAY

St. Paul Builders Have Undertaken to Construct 2,300 Miles.
 Peking, Jan. 15.—The Chinese Government has contracted with the Siemens-Carey Co., of St. Paul, for the construction of an additional 300 miles of railway. The line is to run from Chowkiakow, in Honan province, through Nan Yan Fu to Siang Yang Fu in Hupoh province. The work has been begun by surveyors.

Roadmaster's Sudden Death.
 Brockville, Jan. 15.—John Henderson, G.T.R. roadmaster at Belleville, died suddenly of paralysis here on Saturday afternoon. A wife and family survive.
