FELL OFF SCAFFOLD. William H. McDonald, Collingwood Street, Met Death To-day.

W. H. McDonald, a carpenter, residing at 392 Collingwood street, died as a result of a fall from a scaffold on Monday noon.

Mr. McDonald was working on one of Isaac Allen's houses on Victoria street, near Earl street. He was to have been home for dinner, and when he did not come his wife went to the place where he was working to investigate where the unfortunate man was found lying on the ground near the house dead.
