MAYOR HUGHES ADDRESSED

THE VETERANS' ASSOCIATION MEETING ON MONDAY EVENING.
 Grievances of Returned Soldiers Were Aired and the Secretary Will Act in the Matter.
 The rooms of the Veterans' Association were crowded on Monday evening. At the meeting it developed that there are returned soldiers who are unable to perform their usual duties or in some cases to do work of any kind. These have been turned out without gratuity or pension of any kind. There were eight such cases at the meeting. It was resolved that employment such as in post offices, Customs House or Inland Revenue Department should be given to such men who are capable of doing the work. The order that soldiers after discharge are not allowed to wear their uniform was discussed. This was thought unfair because of the associations that a uniform had with its wearer and the fact that the soldiers like to wear it at church parades, banquets, etc. The secretary was instructed to take action in the matter. A musical programme was given by Staff-Sergt. Mayer, Sergt. Hill, Bandmen Secor and H. W. Shaw.
 After the City Council meeting, Mayor Hughes came into the hall and made a few remarks. He promised to do everything possible for the returned soldiers, and was made an honorary member during his term of office. The members of the Ladies' Auxiliary served refreshments.

CITY COUNCIL'S BIG FOUR TO BE EIGHTEEN ARTICLES

COMPOSED OF ALDS. POLSON, NICKLE, O'CONNOR AND WRIGHT IN PACKAGES BEING SENT TO CANADIANS IN GERMANY.

Right Name of Frontenac Ward Park is "Aberdeen"—Council Pigeon Holes the Woman's Equal Franchise Request.
 According to Ald. Corbett, the City Council has a "big four," namely, Alds. Polson, Wright, Nickle and O'Connor, these being the men selected to do the big work. In the eighties the Council had a "big four," and then the Frontenac County Council twelve years ago had an outstanding "four."

Ald. Wright insists that it is "Aberdeen Park" and Ald. Kent says it is "Frontenac Park." "I have been chairman of parks for eight years," Ald. Kent told the Council last night, "and I have never heard of Kingston having an Aberdeen Park." Ald. Wright declared he would not stand corrected until the city clerk told him he was wrong, and as the clerk remained silent, Ald. Wright looked so triumphantly around the horseshoe as if he had just pocketed a large bet.

There were twenty-one members of Council present at last evening's meeting. Ald. Boyce was the only absentee. Of the twenty-one present, the mayor and ten aldermen did all the talking.
 "Nothing doing" was the sign hung out by the Finance Committee in reply to the Woman's Equal Franchise Committee asking for sympathy and support. Council endorsed the recommendation of the committee.

It would be a good thing if the Council of 1917 and its works committee induced a judge to look into the way in which the city's business has been carried on. He might give a ruling which would be respected and remembered.

A Conservative alderman says that he did not call down the Conservative chairman of the works committee in 1916. Not! And no other Conservative aldermen joined him in his criticism? Then why did Alderman Nickle and Alderman Wright tender their tearful condolences to ex-Alderman Peters at the last meeting of the works committee and offer to resign their seats in his favor? Queer actions for presumably sensible men.
