### RECRUITS NUMBERED 1,003

IN 3RD MILITARY DISTRICT FOR JAN. 1ST TO 15TH.

The Big Increase is Most Gratifying—The Mayor Hughes Cup Goes to the 240th Battalion at Renfrew.

The returns are not announced for all Canada yet, but undoubtedly No. 3 military district, commanded by Brig.-Gen. T. D. R. Hemming, will again lead Canada in recruiting. For the first two weeks of January a total of 1,003 recruits were enlisted, which is immensely pleasing to those concerned, when the last two weeks in December, it will be remembered, showed only 367.

The Mayor Hughes cup goes to the 240th Battalion at Renfrew, commanded by Lieut.-Col. E. J. Watt. This unit enlisted 153 men, and the railway employees depot in Ottawa came second with thirty-two. The cup is awarded on a basis of percentage of strength. The recruits were secured in the following numbers:

There are now 5,917 overseas soldiers in this district.

#### Tidings From All Over Told In a Pithy and Pointed Way.

Australia advanced \$60,000,000 to her farmers for wheat requisitioned by Great Britain.

The United States labor people discussed the advisability of organizing daily newspapers under their control.

A. E. Ness, principal of Port Dalhousie Public School, has been appointed to a cautious position there.

Amalgamation of five offices under the city clerk is proposed in a resolution submitted to Stratford Council.

It is announced that as a result of a breach of faith by a firm in the United States a consignment of Canadian nickel had gone to Germany on the Deutschland.

#### MAJ. DILLABOUGH TO TORONTO.

Coming From Winnipeg to the 228th Battalion.

J. V. Dillabough, Winnipeg engineer, has been appointed major and second in command of the 228th Battalion in Toronto. This unit, practically up to strength, has been created a construction battalion. The major will leave for Toronto Jan. 23rd, but will make an effort to recruit about 100 men before departure.

For years Major Dillabough was resident engineer on the Transcontinental Railway, Winnipeg, and was in charge of construction of the Transcona yards and Red River Bridge. Recently he was on the Hudson's Bay Railway.

Major Dillabough is a Queen's science graduate of 1911, and husband of Louise Singleton, formerly organist of Queen Street Methodist church.

#### MANY ARE OUT YET.

"Posties" Have Not Yet Collected All the Service Cards.

There are still a large number of national service cards out as a result of "posties" not signing them. The "posties" are anxious to get their collection completed, and would be greatly obliged if citizens who have failed to sign the cards would do so at once.

As so many cards are out, the general impression is that many have been keeping "the home fires burning" with the cards.

#### TROUBLES OF A TIPPLER.

Must Now Answer to a Second Charge in the Police Court.

#### PTE. C. W. WATSON WOUNDED.

Is in Hospital With Gunshot Wounds in Face, Legs and Foot.

Joseph Watson, 73 Hickson avenue, on Monday afternoon received a message from Ottawa which stated that Pte. Charles William Watson had been admitted to No. 13 Stationary Hospital at Boulogne on January 6th. He is wounded with gunshot in the face, legs and foot, and as the official message adds the word "severe," his family are anxiously waiting for more information as to his condition.

A London cable says that Brigadier-General H. E. Bursfall (artillery) was on Tuesday gazetted temporary major-general in view of his new divisional command. He left Kingston in August, 1914, in command of the R.C.H.A.

F. P. Block, C. Wauanders, G. Wauanders, G. Ramant, H. A. McAdoo and G. Self, returned soldiers, have reached Quebec, enroute to Kingston.

J. F. Latour, M. Laderoute and W. J. Romani, all of Ottawa, and T. W. Leaper, have enlisted in the Queen's University Highlanders and placed on recruiting duty at their homes. G. Willis, H. E. Huon and G. F. McCutcheon have also signed up.

Ptes. R. McDonald, J. E. Moss and G. E. McCutcheon, Queen's University Highlanders, are taking a course at the School of Infantry.

Sergt. F. Neal, 253rd, recruiting at Picton, was in the city over the week-end.

Lieut. E. L. M. Burns, a cadet at the Royal Military College until the outbreak of the war, when he immediately received a commission and went overseas shortly afterwards, has been decorated with the Military Cross "for laying and repairing armored cables under heavy fire."

Sergt. Frederick Wallace of Iroquois, is here attending the school of Infantry. He is with the 253rd Queen's Highlanders.

Capt. Dodds, former chaplain of the 155th Battalion, has been appointed chaplain of the C.A.S.C. at Bramshott camp.

Capt. Publow, M.O. of the 155th Battalion, has been appointed assistant surgeon of the hospital at Bramshott.

Lieut. Wilson, formerly of the 155th Battalion, is now assistant adjutant of the 224th Forestry Battalion, with headquarters in London, Eng.

At the Royal School of Artillery on Monday the officers attending were asked if they failed to secure commissions would they enlist as gunners for overseas service. About one-quarter of them stepped out, signifying their willingness to go with the lowest rank.

Lieut. Frank Shaughnessy, who has been acting as recruiting officer for the 207th Battalion, is in the party; also Martin Kilt, famous as a footballer and oarsman; "Jack" McCullough, "Jack" McElligott, Bud McCaffrey and several others.

Lieut. R. W. Smith, A.S.C., has left for Regina to take over new duties.

Lieuts. G. O. Driver and Hugh Farthing, Army Service, both of Kingston, have gone to France.

#### AMERICAN DOCTORS READY.

Three Hundred Have Volunteered for the English Hospitals.

London, Jan. 16.—It being contrary to British army practice to give medical commissions to foreign subjects, three hundred American surgeons, who responded to the invitation of the Director-General of Medical Service, will not go to the front to replace British and Canadian medical men, but will fill junior positions in army hospitals throughout this country, so as to release young commissioned British doctors for service abroad. That the American doctors are ready in response to this official appeal is regarded as striking evidence of the friendly feeling of the American profession towards the Allied cause.

#### SHOT HUSBAND DEAD.

When He Tried to Force Her to Drink Liquor.

Denver, Col., Jan. 16.—After a struggle with her husband to prevent him from forcing her to drink liquor, Mrs. John Lawrence Smith shot Smith to death in their home in a fashionable residence district here. Mrs. Smith is the divorced wife of William A. Moore, a Denver attorney. She is 33 years old. Smith who formerly was a chauffeur in the employ of Moore, was 27 years old.
