THE MONEY GIVEN TO UNITS STRONGER THAN EVER

MUST HEREAFTER BE PROPERLY
TAKEN CARE OF

In View of Improper Accounting For
Some Time Past—An Order Issued
By Militia Headquarters.

Throughout Canada reports have
been received continually of suspected
crookedness in the handling of
what is popularly termed "battalion
funds." The money in these funds
is that subscribed by the public for
the use of the soldiers. A recent
order on the matter shows the seriousness
with which this matter has been
attained throughout the Dominion.
It reads:

The attention of Headquarters has
been called to the fact that in many
cases proper accounting is not made
of monies, received by commanding
officers and other officers, from provincial
and municipal authorities, companies
and private individuals. Any such
donations and contributions are to be
considered as trust funds, and must
be dealt with in accordance with the
instructions contained in "Rules for
Management of Canteens and Regimental
Funds, 1916," paragraphs 63-74 inclusive,
subject to the following further provisions:

(a) Any donation received for the
general benefit of the unit is to be
deposited in the regimental fund
account, which is to be kept in a
chartered bank, as the regimental
fund of the unit in question.

(b) Any donations for a special
purpose must likewise be deposited
in a chartered bank, and are to be
placed to the credit of a special
account in trust for the unit, and used
only for the purposes for which the
money has been donated.

(c) No monies, whether received
for general or special purposes are
to be deposited to any personal or
trust account of any of the officers
or members of the units.

**THE PURCHASING POWER OF
PEOPLE OF CANADA.**

Was Greater in 1916 Than in Any
Previous Year—Conditions Summarized
For the Fourth Estate of
New York.

The Fourth Estate of New York,
in a review of the year from the publishers'
and advertisers' standpoint, has this
regarding the Canadian situation:

The end of 1916 found Canada in
a much stronger and more assured
position among nations of the world
than at any time since her birth.
As in the United States the newspaper
publishers of the Dominion of
Canada were kept busy making
changes to meet the increased cost
of labor and news print as well as
the high cost of publishing generally.
The Canadian Press Association directed
the work for the promotion of the
publishers' interests.

The purchasing power of the people
of Canada was greater in 1916
than in any previous year, according
to President J. G. Elliott of the
Canadian Press Association, Inc.,
who summarized conditions as follows:

The value of Canada's agricultural
products exceeded their value in
1915, which was the previous record
year. Large orders for munitions
and other war supplies added to the
ordinary requirements of the country
kept Canada's factories running at
full capacity and, in many cases,
necessitated the employment of
double or triple shifts. There was
an entire absence of unemployment
and for this reason, and because of
higher wages in most lines and considerable
overtime, the average earnings
of the workers was greater than
in any previous year.

The exports from Canada during
the eight months of the fiscal year
commencing April 1, 1916, for which
the official figures are available were
\$731,592,635—a monthly average of
\$91,449,080. This is equivalent to
exports of \$12.19 per month for
every man, woman and child in the
country. The figures for this eight
months' period represented an increase
of 74.62 per cent. over the figures
for the corresponding period of 1915.

Canada's purchases from other
countries during the eight months of
the fiscal year commencing April 1,
1916, for which official figures are
available were represented by imports
valued at \$557,235,197 as compared
with imports during the corresponding
period of 1916 valued at \$398,763,117.

The deposits in the chartered
banks of Canada on November 30,
1916, were \$1,295,870,723, or \$172.78
for every man, woman and child
in the country. These figures represented
a gain of \$174,916,266, or \$23.32
per capita during the preceding
twelve months—this notwithstanding
the fact that the offering in the
spring of 1916 of a domestic war
loan of \$100,000,000 resulted in subscriptions
for almost \$200,000,000.

There was a considerable increase
in the volume of advertising in Canadian
newspapers during 1916 as compared
with 1915. This increase was due to
the improved business conditions,
as indicated by the foregoing figures,
and to the more general recognition
of the fact that the effect of the war
on business conditions had been to
improve them rather than the reverse,
as had been feared by many would be the case.

took place on Jan. 3rd in London,
England, when Helen Grace, eldest
daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. McLelland,
of this city, was united in marriage
to Henry Dayly-Ransom, 3rd Wiltshire
Regiment, only son of Judge Ransom,
late of the Indian Civil Service, and
Mrs. Ransom, of Eastbourne, England.
The ceremony took place at 2.30 p.m. in
the church of St. John's Wood, when
Scotland, Pont street, Knightsbridge,
Rev. Archibald Fleming, D. D., officiated.

The bride, who was given away by
her father, wore a beautiful Parisian
gown of Paspelle blue satin, heavily
brocaded in silver. With this was
worn a charming hat of blue velvet
and silver lace tipped with a spray
of white heather. The bride carried
a shower bouquet of lilies of the valley
and white heather tied with silver
ribbons.

The maid of honor, Miss Dorothea
Godwin, Kingston, wore a gown of

intimate friends.

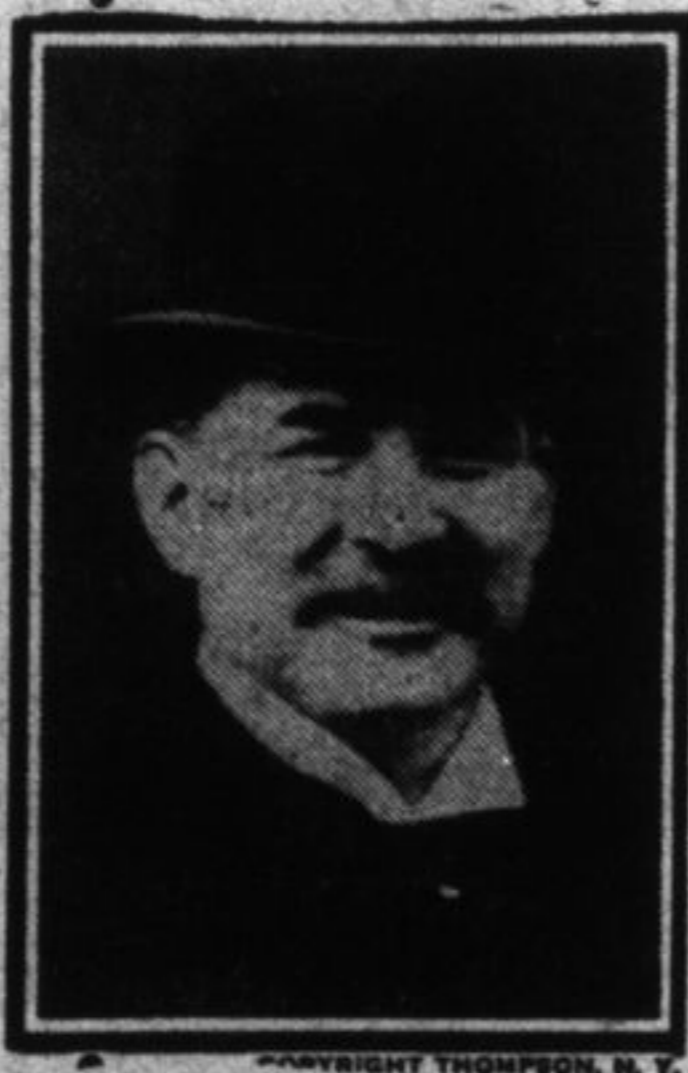
Later Mr. and Mrs. Ransom left
