### DIRECTORS DISAPPOINTED

AT INDUSTRIAL FAIR HAVING SURPLUS OF ONLY \$209.94

Suggestion Was Made to Discontinue the Show—Report of Auditors Presented at Annual Meeting Wednesday Afternoon.

At the annual meeting of the Kingston Industrial Fair Exhibit held in the police court room in the Police Court room on Wednesday afternoon, and at which the president, John A. Wilmet, presided, it was reported that the directors had a surplus of \$209.94.

The report of the auditors, presented by W. J. Cooke and Charles F. Adair contained the following items:

Receipts:—To balance on hand vs. per last annual report, \$345.92; legislative grant, \$234; municipal grant, \$409; membership fees, \$115; cash donations, \$245; membership fees in advance for 1917, including sums retained out of prize monies at 1916 exhibit, \$76. Admission fees to exhibit, \$2,288.25; rent of grounds and stalls, \$222.50; grand stand receipts, \$115.50; legislative grant, field crop competition, \$50; miscellaneous receipts, \$244.42; extra entry fees, \$197.75; total, \$4,534.94. Expenditure:—Cash prizes paid, \$1,134.80; prizes for standing field crop competitions, \$25; meetings and lectures for discussion of agricultural subjects, \$103.50; expenses of delegates, conventions, and exhibitors conventions, \$31; departmental judges, \$44; cash paid for prizes for standing final cash competition, \$50; special attractions, \$568; rent, lighting, \$240.75; purchase of grounds, buildings and insurance, \$75; secretary-treasurer, \$200; auditors, \$16; printing, \$875.90; Red Cross, \$159; postage, \$55.55; labor, \$547.45; meals, \$222.47; incidentals, \$188.88; total, \$4,325.

The report of the auditors brought forth quite a discussion, some of the members stating that they were very much disappointed and had looked for a bigger surplus. One member suggested dropping the fair proposition.

The manager of the show, R. J. Bushell, gave an extensive review of the work of the fair since he took hold of it, and how great progress had been made in spite of heavy expenditure.

The auditors' report was finally adopted. These officers were elected: President—J. L. F. Sprules, Westbrook.
