

CZAR APPEALS FOR SACRIFICE

A Remarkable Rescript is Issued to the Russian People.

STILL MORE VIGOROUS WAR

IS URGED IN HOPE OF A SPEEDY VICTORY.

Calls Upon New Premier, Prince Golitsine, and His Government to Provide Better Supplies for Troops and Improvement in Transport.

London, Jan. 23.—An Imperial rescript has been addressed by Emperor Nicholas to the new Russian Premier, Prince Golitsine, calling upon him among other things to see that the Government devote its first attention to the question of supplies for the armies of Russia and concentrate itself upon the development on a large scale of the measures recently taken in this connection. The text of the rescript, as transmitted by Reuter's Petrograd correspondent reads: "Having entrusted you with the responsible post of President of the Council of Ministers, I deem it opportune to point out to you the pressing problems, the solution of which should be the main object of the Government's attention. "At the present moment, when the tide of war has turned, all thoughts of all Russians without distinction of nationality or class, are directed towards the valiant and glorious defenders of our country, who with keen expectation are awaiting a decisive encounter with the enemy. "Solidarity is essential. "In complete solidarity with our faithful allies, entertaining a thought of the conclusion of peace until final victory has been obtained, I firmly believe that the Russian people, supporting the burden of war with their self-denial, will accomplish their duty to the end, not stopping at any sacrifice. "The natural resources of our country are unending. There is no danger of their becoming exhausted, as apparently is the case with our enemies. All the greater is the significance attached to the settlement of the question of supplies, which is so important and complicated. Accordingly, I call upon the Government, unified in your person, to devote its attention first and foremost to the provisioning of my valiant armies, and behind it the fringing line lessening those difficulties connected with supplies, inevitable in a world war. I count upon it that the joint labors of the whole Government will be concentrated in the realization on a large scale and the development of the measure recently taken towards this end. "Provisioning and Transport. "The question of provisioning the armies and the civil population demands the combined action, not only of all the authorities at the front and in the rear, but also of all the different departments of the empire under the control of the Council of Ministers. "Another problem to which I attach supreme importance is the further improvement of transport, railway and waterway. The Council of Ministers should devise means to show the full utilization of the transport in order to be able, through the co-operation of all departments, to furnish our troops on the fringing line and behind it with all that they require. "In pointing out these pressing problems for your attention I express the hope that the activity of the Council of Ministers, under your Presidency, will meet the support of the Council of the Empire and the Duma, united in a unanimous, ardent desire to carry on the war to a victorious completion. All persons called upon to serve the State should act with will, brightness and dignity towards the legislative institutions. "In its coming activity in organizing the economic life of the country the Government will find invaluable support in the Zemstvos, which by their work in time of peace and of war have proved that they pliously maintain the shining traditions of my grandfather of imperishable memory, Emperor Alexander II."

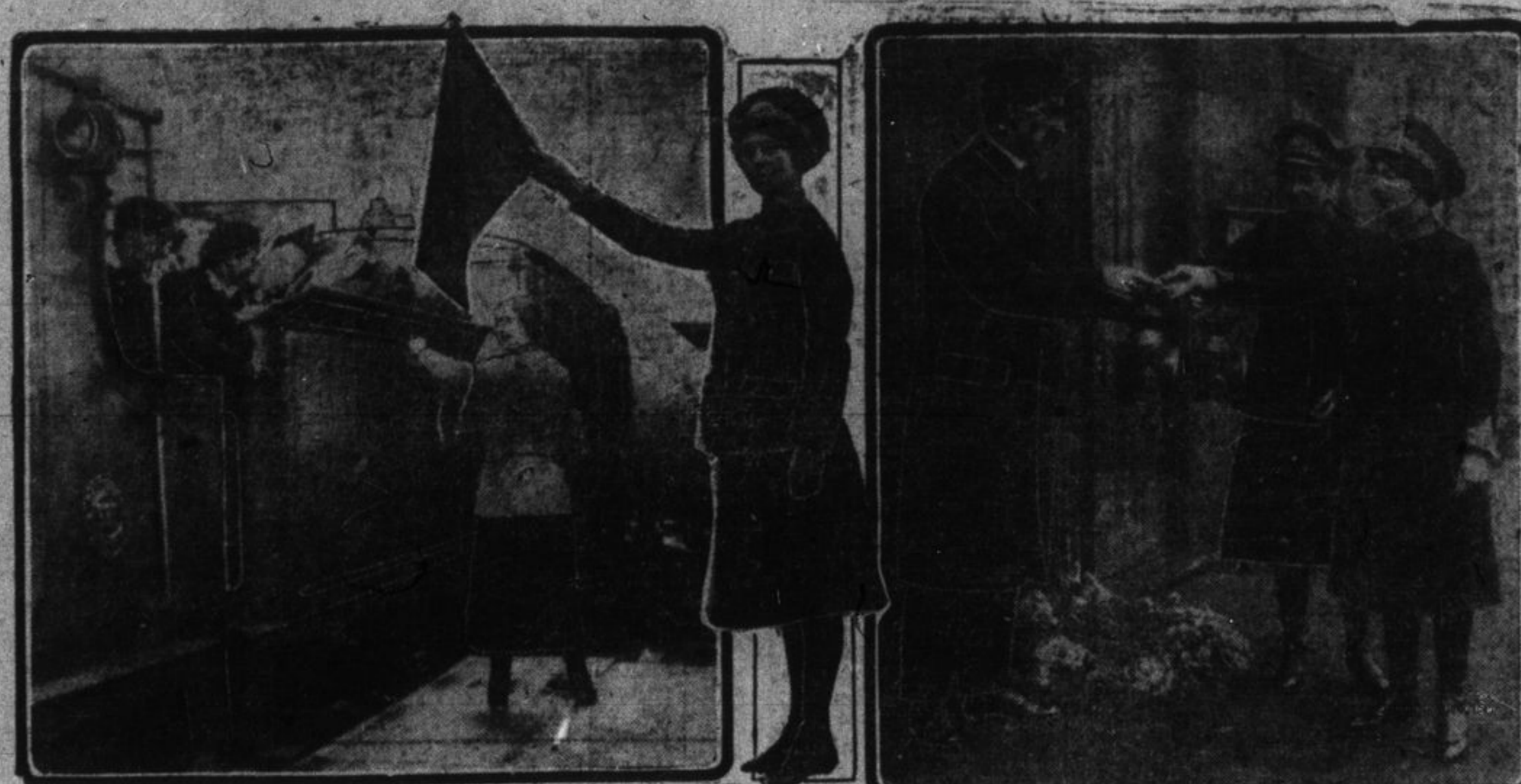

ANOTHER EFFORT BY THE GERMANS

A General Smash Anywhere And Everywhere is Decided Upon.

KAISER A WORN-OUT MAN

THE CHIEF MURDERER HAS AGED GREATLY LATELY.

All Possible Elements of Frightfulness Are Being Prepared—There Are to Be More Horrible Gases and Other Barbarities.

London, Jan. 23.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Chronicle says: "I have just received reliable news from Germany that the moment when all hope of success for the peace intrigues must be abandoned and when naval and military preparations are complete there will be a sudden, general and widespread return to the most violent warfare, in which every shred of restraint will be thrown to the winds in an endeavor to restore Germany's seriously decreasing military prestige at home and abroad. Large new armies and a numerous new fleet of submarines will soon be ready to begin operations. "The information reaches me through a prominent man who in the course of his business spends much time in the western German towns and fortresses, and who happened to be on the spot during the Kaiser's recent tour in Alsace. Speaking of the Kaiser, he said he was greatly changed in appearance. He walks like a worn-out man. His gray hair is not quite white, his face has lost that proud, defiant look, giving place to an almost melancholy expression, tired and worried with the burden of war and fears for the future.

Hindenburg Opposes Kaiser

"Political conditions have grown very strained lately, owing solely to the conflict of views between the Kaiser and Hindenburg, the latter being rather a man after the Crown Prince's heart and desiring to wage war in a manner the Kaiser is said to regard with open dislike. "It is alleged that the peace offer was none of Hindenburg's doing, and now it has failed, popular feeling has again swung over to Hindenburg, who thus has stolen a march on the Kaiser. "Probably within a month new fighting will break out in all its ferocity. Vast hordes of troops, very largely consisting of men between the ages of 40 and 45, with young men of the newest classes of recruits, are now equipped and have been sent chiefly to the depots in Western Germany. The last hordes of these new corps, which are said to number 120, will be enrolled by to-morrow.

On the West Front.

"Either from the moral or military point of view there seems, indeed, every probability that the next few weeks will see the beginning of a desperate onslaught on the west front. To help in this move all possible elements of frightfulness are being piled up in readiness. These include still more horrible gases and other barbarities, than have hitherto been used. "This land onslaught will be waged simultaneously with utmost destructiveness at sea, where the submarines, which official guesses say number nearly 300, will sink on sight. Stories of the size, power and speed of these new submarines do not err on the side of modesty. It is said they are now able to withstand a shell of considerable weight. They also carry six torpedoes tubes each and quick-firing guns. It is freely admitted everywhere in Germany that during the last eight months particularly the losses of submarines have been very heavy. The new submarines are said to be capable of four weeks work without touching anywhere for any renewal of stores, and their speed is much faster than any hitherto built."

BRITISH LABOR MEN ARE DEMANDING MUCH

Minimum Wage, Maximum Day, Liberal Pensions and Conscription of Wealth.

London, Jan. 23.—The Labor party which has grown in seventeen years from 376,000 to 2,220,000 members, will hold a meeting in Manchester, this week, and it is expected to advance demands that will set new outposts in nationalization. Among other things, it is reported that will be asked is advance provision in employment and housing for seven or eight million war workers, raising the scale of wages, and adopting a minimum weekly wage of thirty shillings for common labor, and a maximum of forty-eight hours, nationalization of land, mining, banking and food distribution, and a general conscription of accumulated wealth. It is suggested that work people should be relieved of further increased taxation until all incomes over a thousand pounds are taxed fifteen shillings in the pound, and all unearned income over five thousand pounds to be confiscated during the war, liberal pensions for the war-stricken, and travel studies for all by sea and land are suggested. Evidently labor means to capitalize to the last dollar the temporary advantage enjoyed by its proppergance in the national defence and the indispensability of its party support to the present Government.

Mild Winter Predicted.

The Manitou has spoken to his son the Red Man, according to an old settler, and the great god has told the Indian that he need not lay in an unusual supply of firewood and smoked-ham, and that he need not make his wigwam too powerful for resisting the cold of this winter. The Indian summer, the season vouchsafed to the first Canadian as a reward for his bravery, and which brief respite from the usual warmth and cheer is accepted by the pale-face and brother of the Red Man as the time for getting the storm ash into place and banking the cellar that the potatoes will not freeze, and the water far underneath the ground. He is chopping a little firewood and gathering corn for the vegetable cellar, but he is not unduly perturbed by the imminent approach of the protracted cold season, for has not the Manitou given him the sign of spring? Will come soon again. The Indians are basing their belief on the light corn crop, the scarcity and timidity of the squirrels at this time, when they should be scurrying fearlessly for food for their three caches, the further fact that the muskrats are busy in building their habitations; that the fur-bearing animals have thin coats now when they should be fitting out in their thickest overcoats. To the Indian every sign has a meaning all its own.

Lumberjacks Overcast.

"Although the market prices of best English timber have doubled since the war, and there is a very good reason why we should ease our shipping whenever possible, many owners of private woods and parks decline to help the nation to secure home supplies, though others do what is possible. "This is the opinion which an expert British lumberman expressed to a London News representative. "Canadian lumber-jacks," he continued, "are busy being Crown lands. As their trees have taken generations to grow I suppose landowners have come to look upon them sentimentally more or less as family heirlooms. "There is a big demand for ash, oak, spruce, beech, larch, and pine—the last named for the manufacture of artificial limbs—and timber merchants will take as much as we can supply them with."
