"CONDITIONS IN INDIA" THE DIOCESAN EXECUTIVE

SUBJECT OF INTERESTING ADDRESS BY MISS UNA SAUNDERS.

Who Spoke in Convocation Hall on Tuesday Evening to a Large Audience of Students.

A large and appreciative audience of students and others greeted Miss Una Saunders in Convocation Hall on Tuesday evening when she spoke of "Present Conditions in India."

At the beginning of the war many were apprehensive as to its effect on the loyalty of the people of India and especially on missionary activities. It was feared that the nation would point to it as a demonstration of the failure of Christianity. The very reverse was the case. It had been demonstrated that British had taken up the cause of the oppressed and in so doing had commended Christianity to them. An extraordinary movement is setting up in the direction of the Christian church, especially among the people of the villages where caste distinction is not so marked.

Thousands are seeking admission to its membership, but they have no one to instruct them in Christian teachings. Among the high caste women, there is an awakening to the need of education. They join in the work of the Red Cross and inquire as to its meaning. They want to know what part of the world their men have gone. They have begun to study with interest about their lands and peoples hitherto unknown. War conditions are breaking down the iron wall of caste. Women who formerly would not break caste by touching material, were, in the absence of men, driving their own motors. Women are pressing in to the colleges. It is marvellous what the war is doing. Whenever there is a movement for education it is followed by the sense of a deeper need for something more than education—Christ.

India will not be guided by the west. Indian leadership is needed. They are calling on us to train their young men and young women. This work must devolve upon the church which has called to its aid the specialized workers of the Y.M.C.A. and Y.W.C.A.

A few weeks ago a telegram had been received asking for fifty trained secretaries for the Y.M.C.A. military training camps in India. There were now on the way. At the same time a call came for fifteen secretaries for the Y.W.C.A. They too have been secured and have gone forth.

Miss Saunders closed with an earnest appeal to young men and young women to dedicate their lives to the work of lifting up India's millions.

Miss McArthur, president of the University Y.W.C.A., presided at the meeting.

WHIG PICTURES PICKED UP IN SHELL-SHATTERED BUILDING IN FRANCE BY KINGSTONIAN.

Gunner G. W. Phillips Was Surprised to See Photo of His Brother in Tattered and Torn Portion of Newspaper—Sent Souvenir to His Mother.

A portion of the Whig picture supplement, of Saturday, September 30th, 1916, all tattered and torn, with holes punched through it, picked up in a shell-shattered building in France, is the interesting souvenir that Mrs. George Phillips, of 112 Stephen street, has in her possession. It was sent to her by her son, Gunner G. W. Phillips, who picked it up on his travels.

Gunner Phillips went overseas as a trumpeter with "C" Battery, R. C. H. A., in December, 1915, but was later transferred to the trench mortar battery.

Another interesting part of the story is that Gunner Phillips, on looking at the pictures on the sheet of the newspaper, was given a most agreeable surprise when he found a photo of his younger brother, Neill Phillips. The latter appeared in a group picture of the scholars in the senior third class of Frontenac school.

This incident goes to show how the Whig finds its way to all parts of the world, and is eagerly sought. Gunner Phillips was more than surprised to make such a find, and in his last letter to his mother he enclosed the souvenir, which is prized very much by her.

CONVICT BADLY INJURED GOT HIS HAND AND ARM CAUGHT IN CENTRIFUGAL WRINGER.

The Member Was Badly Fractured and Amputation at the Shoulder. Twenty Years For Assault on Officer at Central Prison.

A convict named A. Cardinal met with a serious accident in the laundry of the penitentiary on Wednesday morning in having his hand and arm caught in the centrifugal wringer.

The arm was badly fractured and otherwise injured, and the surgeon states that amputation at the shoulder will be necessary. He was removed to the General Hospital where an operation will be performed.

Cardinal was convicted at Toronto on January 27th, 1900, and was sentenced to twenty years' imprisonment for an assault on a policeman, which was a very serious bodily harm. The assault was committed upon an officer of the Central Prison by Cardinal while he was serving a term there.

REFUSES TO PERMIT CHANGE IN JAIL GARB

Provincial Secretary Tells Frontenac County Council Change Cannot Be Made.

The Provincial Secretary has written County clerk Bradshaw that the request made by the Council at its meeting last November to change the hideous garb of the prisoners at the jail to something of a more humane nature, cannot be granted, as the regulations set out the garb to be worn by jail prisoners. If the regulations came up for amendment the request of the Frontenac Council would be considered. The application made by the County Council was at the request of G. M. Macdonnell, K.C., who urged that jail prisoners confined for small offences should not be branded as criminals by being displayed around the Court House buildings and public thoroughfares. The present jail garb is a disgrace to the province of Ontario.

Councillor James Halliday told the Whig that the matter would come before the Property Committee, which would take it up with the jail inspector. He was determined that a change should be made in the prison garb.

THE DIOCESAN EXECUTIVE MET IN ST. GEORGE'S HALL ON WEDNESDAY MORNING.

The Grants Made to Mission Churches—Resolutions Were Passed to Bishop Mills and Bishop Bidwell.

On Wednesday morning at ten o'clock the executive committee of the Diocese of Ontario met in St. George's Hall, with Bishop Bidwell presiding. There were present Archdeacon Beamish and Debs, Canon Grout, Fitzgerald, Loucks, Woodcock, Rural Deans Jones, Blagrave, Swayne, Patton, Crisp and Revs. A. L. McFarr, J. H. Coleman, Dunbrille, and Chancellor McDonald, J. R. Dargavel, M.P.P., Francis King (lay secretary), J. Dawson, W. B. Dalton, J. B. Walkem, R. G. Wright, W. B. Carroll and R. J. Carson (treasurer).

Claims of the missions in the diocese were dealt with and grants made as follows:

Class 1, \$100; Rawdon; class 2, \$150; none; class 3, \$200, Marmora and Bannockburn; class 4, \$250, none; class 5, \$300, Augusta, Shannonville, Madoc, Tweed; class 6, \$350, Mallorytown, Frankville, East-ern, Erbert, Pittsburg; class 7, \$400, Marysville, Westport, St. Peter Lake, Loughboro; class 8, \$500, Clarendon, Parham, Coe Hill, North Addington, Bancroft, Maynooth, Selby.

Special grants at the discretion of the Bishop: Oxford Mills as per contract, \$100; Addington, \$100; Ernestown, \$100; Edwardsburg, \$100; Wolfe Island, \$50; Amherst Island, \$100; total, \$8,786.

A report of the Chancellor, recommending immediate collection of all arrears of interest, met with hearty approval.

The following resolution, moved by Canon Fitzgerald and seconded by Chancellor McDonald, was carried by unanimous vote:

"That the executive committee desires to convey to His Lordship Right Reverend Bishop of Ontario its deep sympathy with him in his illness and the assurance that they pray their Heavenly Father to restore him to such good health that the diocese that loves and esteems him may be privileged to have him as its 'loved Father in God, and that a ray of his resolution be sent to his 'ordship'."

Another resolution, moved by Canon Fitzgerald and seconded by Rural Dean J. W. Jones, of Tamworth, was also adopted by a unanimous vote. It was to the effect that the executive committee learned that the Bishop of Kingston was about to go to Oxford, England, to receive a degree of D.D. (honoris causa) desired to congratulate his lordship and wish him bon voyage and safe return to the diocese, which so much appreciated his faithful work and to bid him in such affection and esteem.

There was an interesting discussion on the income of the Clergy Trust Fund earnings, and it was decided to place Archdeacon Debs upon the list of annuitants, to date from January, 1916.

Canon Fornert, on application, was placed upon the superannuation fund of \$200 per annum.

It was reported that the mission savings income amounted to \$17,765.84 and was distributed to the various funds: the diocesan mission fund, \$7,635; M.S.C.C., \$7,000; Widows and Orphans' Fund, \$2,178; and clergy superannuation, \$21.


