A SMALL BLAZE AT THE HOSEIERY MILL

Overheated Smoke Box Did Damage to Extent of \$100.

The firemen were called to the Kingston Hosiery Company's plant at 9.12 o'clock on Thursday night for a small blaze. Fire started between the ceiling and the flooring over the boiler room, caused by the overheating of a smoke box from the boiler to the chimney. The damage will amount to about \$100. Quite a portion of the flooring had to be torn up in order to get at the fire. For some time previous to sending in the alarm employees of the plant, who were at work, could smell fire, but could not locate it. However, by the time the firemen were on the job it was located, and then the firemen, with the use of the company's hose and some chemicals, extinguished the blaze.

Kingston Invalided Soldier Has Arrived at Quebec.

J. O'Neill, formerly of the 39th Battalion, has arrived at Quebec from the front with 250 other invalided soldiers. Pte. O'Neill resided at 11 John street before going overseas. At the front about a year ago, he received a shell wound in the left arm and has been in English hospitals since that time.

TRUANT OFFICER NEEDED

BY FRONTENAC COUNTY, INSPECTOR TRUSCOTT REPORTS.

Peter Ritchie of Kingston Appointed High Constable—A Change Made in the Composition of the County Patriotic Committee.

S. A. Truscott, Inspector of Public Schools for South Frontenac, presented his report to the County Council at its Friday morning session. It showed that of the 169 teachers in his inspectorate, 92 were female and eight males. During the year two teachers enlisted with the 146th Battalion and are overseas. There is an increase in the number of teachers with professional training. The highest salary paid last year was \$380, and the lowest \$290. The average salary for the inspectorate was \$518. Every school has a library. The number of pupils enrolled was 3,075; average attendance, 1,636.

Inspector Truscott complained of the irregularity of attendance of children, particularly in No. 12 Bedford, where it was only twenty-one per cent, and in No. 14 Loughboro, where it was but twenty-eight per cent. Only one rural school, No. 15 Bedford, had a truant officer last year. The inspector urged that a county truant officer be appointed at a small salary, and suggested the high county constable or the Children's Aid Inspector for the position.

The inspector reported that the progress made by the county pupils generally was very satisfactory, especially when the teaching conditions are considered. He stated that the expenditure in a township could be more equally distributed if the schools were in charge of a township board of trustees instead of local boards.

School fairs are held in all the townships but Bedford and Hinckleybrooke. The inspector tried to induce a few of the teachers and boards to introduce the teaching of agriculture into their schools, but was unsuccessful. Household science is not taught in any of the schools. Physical culture and art are being better taught in schools than they were formerly, largely owing to the number of recent graduates from the model and normal schools. In music, where the teacher is capable, the pupils are taught rote songs.

Patriotic Fund Committee.

In order to administer the county patriotic fund without expense Councillor Spankie moved, seconded by Councillor Wensley that the Council rescind the appointment of a committee of five, made on Wednesday, and appoint Clerk J. W. Bradshaw as secretary-treasurer, together with County Treasurer Purdy and School Inspector S. A. Truscott, as members, and also the members of the council as honorary members, and that all give their services free, except the secretary-treasurer.

Councillor Spankie said it cost \$230 last year to administer the fund. This was too large an amount to expend. Secretary Bradshaw did practically all the work last year.

Ald. H. C. Nickle, of the Kingston Patriotic Fund, and also a member of the central executive of the fund at Ottawa addressed the Council with regard to the administration of the fund, which was done at a minimum of cost. In all the municipalities those on the committees serve without remuneration. Only clerical assistance is paid for.

The resolution of Councillor Spankie to change the committee was adopted.

The annual meeting of the Gananoque cheese factory was held on Jan. 24th, when the following statement was read for 1916: Total cash, \$39,955.11; total milk, 2,419,132 lbs.; total cheese, 214,629 1/2 lbs.; average lbs. milk to one lb. cheese, 11.2; average selling price, 18.61 cents per lb.; total butter, 5,841 lbs.; total cash, \$1,732.20; average selling price, 29.6 cents per lb.; rate per ton paid to clear patrons, \$31.63. It was unanimously agreed that the proprietors get 1 1/2 cents per lb. for manufacture of cheese and half cent for making butter for 1917. The officers for the coming season are: J. H. Fawcett, manager; J. B. Wilson, salesman; Mrs. Ina Belfie, secretary and treasurer.
