The annual meeting of the Gananoque cheese factory was held on Jan. 24th, when the following statement was read for 1916: Total cash, \$39,-955.11; total milk, 2,419,192 lbs.; total cheese, 214,620 1/2 lbs.; average lbs. milk to one lb. cheese, 11.2; average selling price, 18.61 cents per lb.; total butter, 5,841 lbs.; total cash, \$1.732.20; average selling price, 29.6 cents per lb.; rate per ton paid to clear patrons, \$31.63. It was unahimously agreed that the proprietors get 1% cents per lb. for manufacture of cheese and half cent for making butter for 1917. The of-ficers for the coming season are: J. H.
