The Prime Minister said that we are on the verge of the greatest liberation the world has seen since the French Revolution, and the peoples who have stood together and staked liberally everything in order to bring that liberty about are going to perpetuate that unity afterwards on an


Altar Presented to Church. Brockville, Jan. 26 .- A handsome gift has just been received by St
