MILITARY CIRCLES

Two N.C.O. instructors after many years of continuous good service have been honored by promotion to the warrant officer rank. They are: Quartermaster-Sergeant Inst. Brown and Quartermaster-Sergeant Inst. Penne, both of the R.S.A. staff, who have been promoted to the rank of sergeant-major instructor with the warrant rank. Sergeant-Major Brown is a Canadian and for nineteen years has been with the R.C.H.A., coming up through the ranks to his present position as an instructor in the royal school of artillery. Sergeant-Major Penne in 1906 enlisted in "B" Battery, R. C. H. A., but had previously been with the imperial army.
