BANCROFT VILLAGE LOSSES HEAVILY BY FIRE

Blaze Sweeps Several Stores—Valuable Furniture Destroyed.

Bancroft, Feb. 9.—The village of Bancroft suffered heavily by fire Monday night. Starting about 11 p.m. at the lower end of the Yellow Block, the fire travelled up the main street until arrested by a vacant lot and a metal-clad building. The fire brigade was helpless because of the breakdown of the engine, but a bucket brigade did heroically to prevent the fire crossing the open space, which alone saved the rest of the business section, churches and residences to the south. Those who lost everything were: C. Russell, pool-room and barber shop; James McCaw, butcher, saved a few things from his stock; and R. S. Denison, lumberman, lost office fittings and a stock of furs, furniture and seven-ton chest of tea. The furniture made for the British-American Hotel, Kingston, in anticipation of the Prince's visit in 1860, was destroyed in this office property. The People's Telephone Co's head office was gutted entirely. The cause of the fire is at present unknown.

MANY HUN U-BOATS SUNK OR CAPTURED

The Pirates Depend Greatly on Their Guns Rather Than Torpedoes.

London, Feb. 9.—Naval officers are sure the next few days will see an offsetting of the Teutons' grand finale of fireworks. Although absolute silence regarding submarine operations is the rule among naval men, it is said that the Admiralty's measures are proving effective and that a fair average of submarines is being captured or sunk.

It is impossible to get any figures regarding the number of U-boats not sunk, as some reports from Scandinavian countries have placed it.

For the last week all wireless stations, cables and telegraph wires have been crammed with reports as to the effect of the new submarine activity. All show that the submarines now depend greatly on their guns rather than on torpedoes to accomplish the sinking of ships. Out of seven torpedoes fired at merchant ships not a single one found its target. The vessels either saw the torpedoes and managed to evade them or the German marksmanship failed.

British Navy Saves Shipping.

(Special to the Wigs.) New York, Feb. 9.—The British navy seems to be getting the submarine menace under control, and it is presumed many submarines have been sunk or captured. Only four ships are reported sunk to-day up to 3 p.m. New York time. Three of these were Norwegian and one British.

A BIG PATRIOTIC MEETING

WAS HELD AT BEULAH CHURCH, PARROT'S BAY.

In the interests of the 243rd Queen's Highland Battalion on Thursday Evening—Stirring Addresses Were Delivered.

A large and enthusiastic gathering under the presidency of Reeve Leungmore of Camden was the result of the labors of the members of the Women's Institute of Collins Bay and district on Thursday evening. The meeting was held at Beulah church, Parrot's Bay, and was addressed by Judge Layell, Rev. Mr. MacTear of Bath, and Lieut. E. W. Skinner, 253rd Q. U. Highland Battalion, and a varied programme of recitations, solos and instrumental selections were rendered, by Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Seymour, Miss Parrott, Corp. Sterry and Piper Fraser.

Judge Layell enforced the responsibility which rests on every member of the community in these strenuous days, and the duty of all, both men and women, to do all that lies in their power to further the greatest national effort the world has seen.

Rev. Mr. MacTear showed that the peace which was so necessary to the prosperity of the individual could only be attained by the readiness of every citizen to subordinate his own well being to that of the community, and to defend his own and the national interests by serving himself, in person, or by contributing to the support of those who were able to go.

Miss Fairfield, Secretary of the Women's Institute reported on the work done for the Red Cross and showed the need of more gifts of money and materials.

Lieut. E. W. Skinner of the 253rd (Queen's University) Highland Battalion, C.E.F., set forth the opportunity which the Battalion offered to those who were able to go themselves. He laid it on the conscience of those present to enlist if they were physically fit, and if not, that they should stimulate and encourage those members of their families who were able to come forward. The meeting was brought to a close by the regimental march of the 253rd Q. U. Highland Battalion, "The Campbell's are Coming," by Piper Fraser, and the National Anthem. A good collection was taken up for the Red Cross.
