

KINGSTON TEAM'S EASY WIN

DEFEAT PETERBORO IN JUNIOR O.H.A. GAME BY 17 TO 2.

Peterboro Had Only Six Men on the Ice—Montgomery, of the Visitors' Defence, Had His Back Severely Injured.

Kingston Juniors had an easy victory over Peterboro here on Friday night in the O.H.A. semi-final of the eastern district. They won by 17 goals to 2, and as they defeated Peterborough Monday night on the latter's rink by 6 to 2, they are winners of the round by 23 to 4.

It was 9.15 o'clock before the game started, the hour's delay being caused by the late arrival of Referee Hewitson from Toronto. Owing to the snowstorm the G.T.R. train was delayed, and Mr. Hewitson learned that in stormy weather it is best not to wait for the last train.

Owing to the inability of Frost to accompany the visiting team, Peterboro played six-man hockey, Kingston used its right to play their full team, and thus had a decided advantage. A regrettable accident occurred to Montgomery of the Peterboro defence. This player suffered a severe injury to his back and had to retire from play. It was thought he would have to be left in hospital here, but his team mates were able to convey him home with them.

The first period of play was very good, the score being 3 to 0, but after that Kingston scored almost at will. Shewell, Gratton and Stinson scored for Kingston in the first period. In the second, Montgomery tallied Peterboro's first score, and then Stinson scored two and Evans one for the home team, making the tally 7 to 1. In the third period, Shewell, Stinson, Evans and Elmer each scored.
