

Never Would Be Any if Relief Commission Can Obtain Funds.

Philadelphia, Feb. 12.-Herbert C. Hoover, Chairman of the Commission for Relief in Belgium, told members of the City Club, in an address that there is no starvation in Belgium at present, and that there would not be any "as long as the Commission is given the funds to

continue its work." He said that the Belgians are now healthy, "But," he added, "it is the vital duty of Americans to give aid that this health may be maintained. Without this aid Belgium must
