

DRATS TO BE SENT IN FUTURE OVERSEA

No More Complete Infantry Battalions to Go From Canada.

Ottawa, Feb. 12 .- Provision has been made for the representation of various territorial divisions of Canada by battalions or groups of battalions in England at the front. Consideration is consequently being given here to plans to bring into conformity with this new arrangement overseas, the system of raising reinforcements in the Dominion and
