BRITAIN STANDS DAILY GROWING STRAIN OF WAR Allies Can Continue Fight Indefinitely, Bonar Law Tells Commons.

London, Feb. 12.—In a stirring speech, Chancellor of the Exchequer Bonar Law declared yesterday before the House of Commons that England will and is able to continue the war indefinitely from every standpoint and that in matters pertaining to the financing of the needs of her armies she towers high above her enemies.

The minister of the exchequer had appeared before the Commons to move the extension of the national credit. He said that the average expenditure has reached \$5,790,000 daily and that since the beginning of the war it has been necessary for the Government to spend \$4,200,000,000.

Despite this terrific financial strain, Bonar Law declared that Great Britain is able to bear up under it far longer than can her enemies.
