A mother lying ill on a couch in a home in which there was no fire, and four little children, ranging in age from one year to five, with no erson to care for them, was the sad ondition of affairs that was found in a home on Pine street when Police Constable Samuel Arniel had occasion to visit the home on Monday

Constable Arniel immediately got busy, and after rendering first aid in to the family, in the way of starting a fire and doing what he could for the woman and her little tots, he reperted the case to Inspector Jack, of the Children's Aid Society, and Mrs. Smith, wife of Ensign Smith, of the Salvation Army, and as a result both them other and children are now receiving the very best or care. The mother was removed to the Hotel Dieu, two of the children were placed in the Orphans' Home, and the other two in the Infants' Home.
