BREAKING UNITS NECESSARY EVIL

London Morning Post Comments on Statement of Col. Pelletier.

IT WAS NOT REFLECTION

UPON ABILITY OR QUALIFICATION OF OFFICERS.

Often Impossible to Send Units in Contact on Active Service—Commanding Officers of Broken Units Were Looked After.

London, Feb. 14.—The Morning Post says: "The practice of Canadian military authorities in England of breaking up units trained together in Canada, which Col. Pelletier, Agent-General for Quebec, stated in an interview published in The Morning Post, had caused some disappointment in the Dominion, has been followed, we are authoritatively informed, not from choice but from military necessity.

TURKS MUST SHORTLY LEAVE KUT-EL-AMARA

Success of Anglo-Indians a Matter of Time When Communications Cut.

London, Feb. 15.—The present offensive against Kut-el-Amara began with presumably three full army corps, or 120,000 Anglo-Indians, on December 13th, 1915. Up to that time, from April 28th, when General Townshend, after a siege begun December 7th, 1915, surrendered 9,000 armed men and 5,000 camp followers, little had been heard of this town.

The present operations began with an advance along the Shatt-el-Hal, a canal which enters the Tigris above and below the city from the south, and was strongly fortified by the Turks after Townshend's surrender. On January 9th and 10th an Indian division by two assaults cleared the land between the canal and the river up to the trenches of the town itself. On January 25th some of these trenches were recovered; then, by January 28th, the Anglo-Indian forces cleared all the land southwest of the city and held the first and second lines of trenches over a front of 4,300 yards.

Committee Appointed to Consider Needed Improvements, in Sunday School Furnishings—Tea Held Before Meeting.

Chalmers Church held its annual meeting Wednesday evening. High tea was served at 7 o'clock. The donations were beautiful and the repast deserved a more high sounding name than a "tea."

After refreshments, the meeting was duly constituted, and David Murray voted to the chair and Ross McRae to the secretary's desk. In close succession the following reports were presented, received and adopted: Sunday school, Young Women's, Magillivray Mission Band, Women's Missionary Society, Choir, Chalmers' Club, Sessions, Trustees, Library, Ladies' Aid. All indicated considerable activity during the year, and the tone was hopeful for the future.

Numerically, members and families have not varied much from last year. Total contributions for all purposes, \$19,285.00; for missions, \$3,362.00; from all sources for benevolent purposes, etc., \$1,518. T. M. Robertson, George D. Mahood and Alex. G. Flett were elected Trustees for three years. A committee was appointed to consider much-needed improvements in the Sunday school furnishings and other structural defects.

TEA IS UP IN PRICE

Demand is Greater and the Supply is Smaller.

Tea is costing today about seven cents a pound more than it did three weeks ago, that is to say, the 35c tea, which is practically the cheapest tea on the market, sells now for 42c. The manager of one of the largest firms in the city told the Whig this morning that the demand for tea was greater than ever and the supply on hand smaller.

The lack of ocean freight carriers and all the difficulties and risks at present incurred in transporting tea from the place of growth to the bottom of it all," he said. "Importation has become very difficult. The London market jumped 5c last week and it has already advanced 2c this week, an increase in all of 7c on the price of two weeks ago. The prospects are that the increase will be 10c on the pound in a few days." So for the old 35c tea the public will pay 45c, an increase of over 28 per cent on a food product that few households can do without.
