### CANADA AND STATES IN SOCCER SERIES

U. S. F. A. President Suggests New Dates for the International Honors.

When the international soccer game between the United States and Canada was postponed last fall the United States governing body proposed that it be played in the early part of April this year. The Canadian authorities objected to this date because the Canadian players, who were selected from teams between Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal would be out of the game all winter, whereas the American team play throughout the winter months.

President Fernley, of the U. S. F. A., has taken the matter up again with his executive committee, and in a letter to Secretary Spencer of the D. F. A., recommends that the game be played on October 14th next at Providence. Three games are suggested, one in Boston on Oct. 13th, the international fixture in Providence on the following day and a third game in Newark, N. J., on Oct. 15th. These dates are subject to the approval of the D. F. A.

If this schedule is adhered to it will necessitate the carrying of more players than was originally intended. The council of the D. F. A. will consider the matter at an early meeting.

### FRAT. IS "CRAWLING."

Realize Bluff is Over And Is Looking For an Easy Way Out.

It was stated on good authority that the Players' Fraternity realize that their cause has been hopelessly weakened because so many of their players have secretly deserted. It is believed that the threatened strike would be called off by the Fraternity if it could withdraw from the difficulty gracefully. It would not be surprising if the Fraternity during the present week of baseball activity should permit the major league players to renounce their pledge not to sign up.

President Tener, of the National League, said that he believed that the Fraternity should release the players from the action they had taken by their pledges, and if the minor league players had any difference with the minor league club owners they should adjust these matters themselves without drawing the major leagues into trouble.

### Baseball Dates Arranged.

The National Baseball league has arranged its schedule for the coming season. It will open April 11th and close on October 4th. There will only be one or two unavoidable clashes with the American leaguers.

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### Quits Game in Disgust.

Fred Kippert, who was released by the Reds without half a trial, and who led the Northwestern League in batting last summer, announces his retirement from the game. "I have averaged .335 in my hitting during a ten-year career," says Kippert, "and yet have never had a show in fast company. What's the use of going on forever in the minors, especially after a fellow has reached an age where he is no longer looked upon as a youngster or a coming player?"

### Jack Munro Appointed.

The Speaker has appointed Jack Munro, the returned Princess Park hero, former mayor of Elk Lake and one time champion pugilist to take charge of the Ontario Legislative Conservative committee room during the session. He will have with him his famous dog which he brought back from France.

### Without a Bridle in the English Chase.

London Sporting Life: Newey performed a wonderful riding feat when he won the Grand National Steeplechase on Eremon after breaking a leather the first time round, but that performance was no more surprising than that of Reardon yesterday, as the latter jockey found himself without a bridle when Excelsior blundered badly at the fence beyond the water in the Hookwood Selling Steeplechase at Gatwick. Not only did Reardon complete the course without Mr. Wootton's chestnut, jumping four more fences, but he actually finished third in the race, keeping the horse in the course and guiding him with his whip. A soldier confrere standing by as Reardon came back into the unsaddling enclosure remarked: "That's how they ride them in the army." Reardon, by the way, is a sergeant in the A. V. C.

### RUMANIAN KING HONORS

Flight Lieut. Arthur F. Jacobs, an English Oarsman. The King of Rumania has personally presented to Flight-Lieut. Arthur F. Jacobs the highest Rumanian order, that of Michael the Brave, for bringing down near Braila a German two-engined battleplane. Flight-Lieut. Stuart (beaten that year in the Henley Diamond Sculls by the Italian Sinigaglia) at Marlow, the Metropolitan and Molesey regattas.
