235TH BATTALION MOVES

HAS RECEIVED ORDERS TO MOVE TO OTTAWA FROM BELLEVILLE.

Will Relieve Belleville's Recruiting Situation, Leaving the 254th Battalion Only.

At last the military situation of Belleville—that of having two overseas battalions recruiting in the one area—has been cleared by the order issued on Friday that the 235th Battalion go immediately to Ottawa and take over the quarters vacated by the 207th Battalion. To those acquainted with the Belleville situation it seems that both units will now have a fair opportunity of getting up to strength, and the move will eliminate the ill-feeling that has been aroused between the two big recruiting parties.

The 235th, was authorized last August to be recruited in Durham and Northumberland counties. When quarters were available in Belleville, before the 254th was authorized, the headquarters of the battalion were moved that far east and the recruiting area extended. With the authorization of the 254th at Belleville it rapidly developed into a "free-for-all" for recruits from the district, but an ill-feeling between the men of the two units made progress for either very difficult. It has been felt for some time that a move would clear away the trouble and Brockville was suggested.
