ROSE FROM THE RANKS.

Splendid Record of Clever Nova Scotia Soldier.

A young man from Truro, N.S., has made rapid progress since the outbreak of war. P. H. Lawrence, who was a Canadian express messenger in 1914, and enlisted with the first Highland regiment to cross overseas, is now Lieut. P. H. Lawrence, H. E. technical assistant, T. W. R., ministry of munitions, London, and at last account was on a special mission to Petrograd.

In brief, this is the story of Lieut. Lawrence's progress: He was present at the first chlorine attack made by the Germans, and fell a victim to the rear, and as he had only inhaled a small quantity he quickly recovered. Within a few days Lawrence, who had been promoted sergeant, and a chum, entered a German trench and secured a gas projector and incidentally added to the number of men in Germany.

The War Office then issued to Sergeant Lawrence an order to prepare a number of these machines. Early in the present year Sergeant Lawrence was given a commission and attached as a technical assistant at the office of the ministry of munitions. In May last he was sent on a special mission to Petrograd. Since entering the imperial service he has been engaged in work which requires the utmost secrecy and beyond an occasional brief note regarding his chattering addresses, his relatives on the Atlantic hear little regarding him.

To Join Red Cross. Miss Annie Halliday, Watertown, N.Y., a graduate of the City Hospital, and who formerly lived at Kingston, has accepted a position as a nurse with the Canadian Red Cross Association for hospital work at Kingston. Miss Halliday will leave Watertown, N.Y., says the Times, February 20th, for her new position. The new hospitals are being put in readiness for the wounded Canadian soldiers who are on their way from over the sea.

Death Ended Royal Scandal

SNUBBED by court officials, taunted by those who were jealous of her power, forbidden entrance to the death-chamber of the man who loved her, Katti Schratz makes her exit from Austrian affairs. That she takes with her into retirement a handsome legacy from her royal lover, the late Francis Joseph of Austria, makes a fitting ending to a very sordid affair. The liaison between the emperor and the actress was particularly notorious because it lasted thirty years.

As astounding as the fact may seem, it is now known that the late Empress Elizabeth was herself responsible for the bringing together of the Emperor and the actress. We have it on the authority of the Countess Marie Larisch, who, in her remarkable book entitled "My Past," lays bare not only many of the facts concerning the extraordinary relationship of the Emperor and his queen, but also the soul of the unfortunate royal wanderer who was assassinated in Geneva. It appears, from what the countess writes, that the frequent trips abroad of the Empress Elizabeth were made in the hope of relief from the disappointment of a wrecked life and a vanished love. Yet, says the queen's erstwhile companion, "her kind heart reproached her when she thought that her husband would perhaps be lonely in her absence." Elizabeth then made inquiries of her ladies-in-waiting to find out if any of them knew of someone who could be relied on to comfort the Emperor while she was abroad. "I mentioned several ladies," writes the countess, "who, I felt sure, would only be too delighted to console the imperial lady in her wanderings. But why should I grow lonely, when the Master is to me a friend that sticketh closer than a mere fraternity. Sometimes the nights seem longer than they did in days gone by. A Strange Event on the St. Lawrence River. Clayton-on-the-St. Lawrence. From May 15th, 1885, to the same date this coming spring will be thirty-one years and almost to the half-way mark of life's span who then had not been born. A strange sight greeted the vision of residents along the shore on that May morning—that of ice in the waters that had been clear the night before, and so solidly blocked from Prospect Point to Frontenac that several men walked on it from the village wharves to Calumet Island. A large lake sailing vessel and a tug with several barges in tow were caught in the jam and held for a day or so, as immovable as if hauled out on dry land. In every direction great icebergs were stranded on bottom, and one stopped to remain several days in water twenty feet deep a little way out from where the uptown Standard Oil station now is, and several adventurous boys went out in boats to climb upon it. The great waves of Lake Ontario during the winter before formed the icebergs that several weeks of almost continual north winds during spring kept back at the upper end of the lake, to break loose and drift down to make a month of May seem like wintry March. They were icebergs, and many of them, in sight on May 24th, the anniversary of Queen Victoria's birth. Many photographs of the interesting scene were taken, some of which are still in existence.

EASTERN ONTARIO UNITS

Appear in Two of the New Brigades. In the reorganization scheme of the Canadian troops in England on territorial lines which has just been completed, there are six brigades. They are officially described as Canadian Reserve brigades, and the battalions composing them are to act as reinforcements in the field with which they are affiliated. Eastern Ontario battalions appear in two of these brigades. The 1st reserve Eastern Ontario Battalion is a unit of the 1st brigade, and is composed of the 39th and 18th Eastern Ontario overseas battalions and its affiliated battalions in the field are the 20th and 21st. The next Eastern Ontario reserve battalion is the 5th, and it forms a unit of the 5th Canadian reserve brigade. It is composed of the 95th Eastern Ontario overseas battalion, and its affiliated battalions in the field are the 2nd and 38th.
