LIEUT. VICTOR A. LANOS

IS-SIGNALLING OFFICER OF THE 124TH BATTALION.

He Describes the Work of His Corps—Writes His Hockey Friends at Home to Get Into Khaki and Bring Their Skates With Them.

Prof. J. M. Lanos, of the Royal Military College has received the following interesting letter from his son Lieut. Victor A. Lanos, in England: "It might interest you and my friends to hear something about my work as signalling officer of the 124th Battalion. Our signallers are a splendid bunch, and the first-class English qualified, and their phone work is a marvel. They came direct from the Shorncliffe, where they have been in training for months. We have now altogether fifty-three qualified men, the smartest signalling section in the country.

"The work with the signallers is very interesting and a trifle different to the instruction we received in Canada, though you may tell Major Mudd that the course I had at Barriehfield cannot be beaten, except, it goes without saying, for the different equipment. We use the disc, the Mark I, Electric Lamp, and D III telephone. Strange fact, I find in the section half a dozen men who took the school with me in the summer, or with you in the winter, a year ago. Corporals Brodie and Magnus are two names that occur to me now. Night work is especially interesting: "While the companies are digging trenches—and putting up entanglements, we fix up our headquarters about 500 yards to the rear, well concealed, and then run the wires to the four company phones in the front trenches. In a few minutes the messages are going through; then a metallic circuit is completed to obviate the induction, and we start burying our wires. This is no easy task in the frozen ground. Every few seconds a star shell bursts over our heads, and whilst machine guns and rifles pop away, we hug the ground and freeze. Later on the bombers put on a display with their puff-bombs, the wire-cutters and scouts are busy, and finally the gas Alert sounds and a thick cloud of fumes pours over us as we lie low, helmeted and protected.

"I almost forget to tell you of the last two days of my final leave, and the biggest treat I have had in England. In short I went skating with a most select company on one of the big ponds at Wimbledon. It was great, though I did have an awful tussle with the wooden skates I hired. They were about 100 years out of date; but, nevertheless, I managed to glide, without even a single fall. This is the coldest winter that England has experienced for thirty years, and people are suffering a great deal, though to us it is all the more homelike to see the ground covered with snow, and the ponds with ice.

"Tell my hockey friends who are staying in Canada to put on the uniform quickly and pack up with

skates, pucks and sticks. They won't even miss their favorite sport when joining the soldiers."

"MY KILLARNEY ROSE"

Was Produced at the Grand on Thursday Evening.

The production of "My Killarney Rose" on Thursday evening at the Grand was greeted by a large house, and it certainly deserved it. The play is one of those simple Irish novels dramatized for the stage and produced by a master of the art.

E. W. WALDRON ARRIVES

At New York on S.S. Philadelphia—U-Boats Eluded.

E. W. Waldron, of Kingston, was on the S.S. Philadelphia, which arrived at New York Thursday afternoon with 241 passengers. The liner passed through the German submarine zone, but no U-boats were sighted. The Philadelphia carried more than a score of survivors from various ships torpedoed recently.

Capt. Barry, Ex-Kingstonian, Is Dead.

The Chicago Canadian-American says: Capt. Miles E. Barry, former alderman of the twenty-first ward and well known in transportation circles, passed away Thursday at his residence, 40 South Eldara avenue, Chicago. He was a grandnephew of Commodore "Jack" Barry of the American revolution. Capt. Barry was born in Kingston, Ont., in 1857. At sixteen he came to Chicago. He and his five brothers owned the Independence Tug Line. Later he was member of the Barry Brothers Transportation Company. He is survived by his widow and his three children, the Misses Honor and Florence Barry and Miles Barry, Jr.
