THE LATE THOMAS SHANNON.

An Aged and Greatly Esteemed Resident of Sunbury. Sunbury, Feb. 28.—On Thursday, Feb. 22nd, Thomas Shannon passed away. He was born at Sunbury on June 15th, 1834, where he lived continuously until his death, which was due to a complication of diseases. He was married on Nov. 20th, 1855 to Sarah Ferguson, who died on Feb. 20th, five years ago. They had one son, William, who was married to Annie Lyman on July 16th, 1884, and of whom died over eleven years ago, leaving eight children with the aged grandparents. These grandchildren are Harvey, Thomas and Harry at home, and Norman, C.E.F., France; Mrs. Dr. M. H. McDonald, Forget, Sask.; Mrs. J. A. Sharpe, Sunbury; Mrs. (Rev.) George Clark, Long Beach, California; and Mrs. William Sloan, Sunbury. Mr. Shannon was converted to God fifty years ago. He united with the Methodist church, and continued a staunch and liberal supporter to the end. Mr. Shannon was of a kind, cheerful, and sympathetic disposition. The honored place which he received and the affectionate relationship which existed was a marked feature of his home. His counsel and advice will be missed. The funeral service was held in the Methodist church on Saturday at 2 p.m. A very large number attended the service which was conducted by Rev. A. W. Stewart, pastor of the church, assisted by Rev. J. E. Caswell. The service was of a very impressive character. A trio entitled 'Oh What a Change,' was sung by Mrs. Henry Lyman and Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Stewart. The remains were placed in the vault at Sand Hill cemetery.

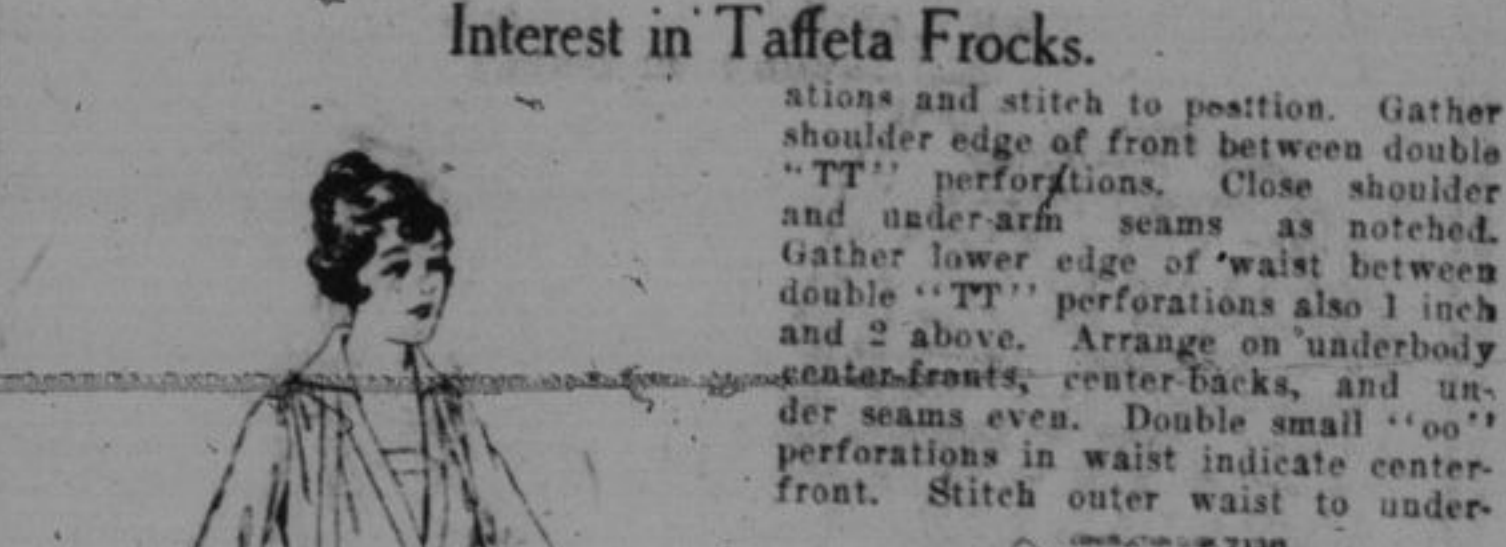
Suit For Damages Fails.

Interest in Taffeta Frocks. Ations and stitch to position. Gather shoulder edge of front between double "TT" perforations. Close shoulder and under-arm seams as notched. Gather lower edge of waist between double "TT" perforations also 1 inch and 2 above. Arrange on underbody center-back seam, center-back seam, and under-seams even. Double small "oo" perforations in waist indicate center-front. Stitch outer waist to under-

Lanark

Still another version of the one-piece frock. Taffeta is used for its development, although the model is very effective in embroidery finishing. There is no division of opinion regarding the favorite position the taffeta frocks hold in the world of dress. A very pretty one-piece design is pictured here, having a one-piece gathered skirt and a waist that fastens in semisurplice effect. The flowing sleeves have attached one-piece cuffs finished very simple with stitching. In medium size the dress requires 5 1/2 yards 36-inch material, with 3/4 yard 36-inch lining for underbody and 3/4 yard extra taffeta for bands cut lengthwise or crosswise. To make the underbody, first close the underarm and shoulder seams, then plait the lower edge of front and back and tack. Turn the hem in front, and adjust stay underneath body, lower edges even and stitch at upper and lower edges. Adjust vest on right underbody front, center-front and lower edges even. Finish left side of vest for closing. The front edge of the outer waist must be not underlaid about 1 inch back in line of small "oo" perforations, with Tura edge back on small "oo" perforations.
