Agree to Modify Terms. Ottawa, March 6 .- The Canadian paper manufacturers have agreed to supply Canadian newspapers with newsprint at two and a half cents at the mill. This is satisfactory to the Government and the proprietors, and so renders unnecessary any action by he Government under the recent order-in-council which gives it power to limit or prohibit export, or even to seize and operate the mills.
