OVERLAPPING OF TRADES

UNDER DISCUSSION BY TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL.

A Conference Will Be Arranged When Matter Will Be Taken Up by Representatives of the Various Trades—Big Crowd Attend Meeting.

The members of the Trades and Labor Council held their regular meeting on Thursday night, and it was marked by a very large attendance; in fact it was the biggest turnout the members have had at their meetings all winter. Several interesting matters to the labor men were under discussion. The president, Ernest Cain, was in the chair.

A matter taken up, which has been discussed from time to time, is that of the different trades overlapping each other, carpenters doing work of plumbers and vice versa. The trades, so it appears, have been infringing on each other's work, and an endeavor is to be made to stop this practice. As a result, it was arranged to hold a conference of representatives of all the trades in order that the matter can be discussed and a settlement arranged.

A communication was received from the British Columbia Federation of Labor, asking the council to petition the Government to have a referendum before conscription. No action was taken.

EVAN BOYLE SAYS "NOT GUILTY."

Alleged Confession Disallowed, as She Wasn't Warned.

Montreal, March 16.—Charged with murdering Albert Haynes on January 8th by shooting him on the street, Eva Boyle appeared in the court of King's Bench yesterday. The line of the defence will take has not been outlined yet, though it is known that the suggestion that the girl plead guilty to manslaughter, which would probably be acceptable to the Crown, has not been accepted.

The prisoner pleaded not guilty to the charge of murder.

Crown Attorney Walsh in his address to the jury, placed emphasis on a confession he said the girl made when herself badly wounded, she was admitted to the Royal Victoria Hospital.

This confession was thrown out when the Crown sought to introduce it, on the ground that the prisoner had not been warned that statements she might make would be used against her.

It developed during the hearing that Eva Boyle had a husband living in Scotland. A description of a peculiar fit the girl had on one occasion was also given in the evidence.

BURNED TO DEATH IN PATHETIC ACCIDENT

Arnprior Woman Was Standing at Stove When Dress Caught Fire.

Arnprior, March 16.—On Tuesday Miss Annie Campbell, a most esteemed and well-known resident of Pakenham, lost her life in a peculiar manner. While emptying the floor sweepings into the stove, the flame thus caused seemed to have suddenly gushed up, lighting the unfortunate woman's clothing, which was soon a mass of flames. Becoming excited, she rushed into the front part of the house, where her brother, John Campbell endeavored in vain to extinguish the flames with his hands, and was severely burned himself.

From the burning pieces of clothing the carpet also took fire, and it was with the greatest difficulty that the house was saved from destruction. So severely was the unfortunate woman burned that she died soon afterward. Miss Campbell was in her forty-seventh year, and had resided with her brother on the 9th concession of Pakenham for some time.

BRITISH WHEAT OFFER HAS BEEN REJECTED

Western Farmers Not Satisfied With Dollar and Thirty Cents a Bushel.

Ottawa, March 16.—The Western farmers are not satisfied with the British offer of \$1.30 per bushel for the Canadian wheat crop. The Canadian Council of Agriculture which has been in session at Regina has reported to Sir George Foster that the crop should be sold at \$1.50 as a minimum price and a maximum price of \$1.90 for No. 1 Northern A-1 Winnipeg or, falling that, a flat price of \$1.70 on the same basis at Fort William. The other grades down from No. 1 Northern would be valued according to milling and baking tests. The British offer was for \$1.30 for No. 1 Northern at Fort William so that the Western farmers want no less than forty cents a bushel more than the Imperial authorities have offered. On the basis of an export crop, say of one hundred million bushels, this would mean that the Western farmers ask forty million dollars extra from the British Government.

Sir George Foster, as acting Prime Minister, will transmit the offer of the Council of Agriculture to Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, but there is little likelihood of the British authorities agreeing to pay forty cents a bushel more.

Considerable surprise is expressed at Ottawa at the action of the farmers in view of the pressing necessities of Great Britain for foodstuffs. There is a strong feeling that they are endeavoring to hold up the British Government.

GERMAN WITHDRAWAL FASTER THAN EXPECTED

London, March 16.—Brig. Gen. Frederick E. Maurice, chief director of military operations at the British War Office, states that the withdrawal of the Germans from the Bucquoy line, on the Somme front, is taking place faster than anticipated, and that the whole new line might soon be on the reverse side of the Bapaume ridge.

Charlie Chaplin, the moving picture actor, who was a heavy purchaser of the first Canadian war loan, has just put in an order to the Canada Bond Corporation for a \$58,000 allotment of the new loan.

The Canadian timber land property of the bankrupt Battle Island Paper Company of Fulton, N.Y., which was purchased in liquidation proceedings by Levi S. Chayman of this city for \$130,000, has been resold at a good profit.

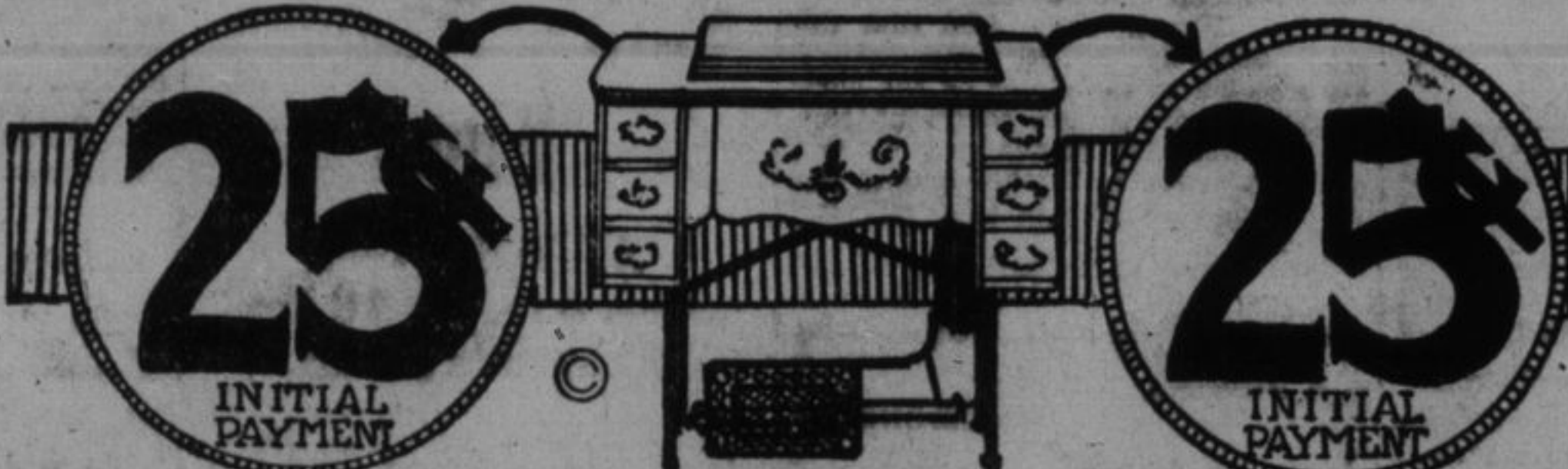
