THE ARTS CONCURSUS CONVENED ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON
 Sorrow at the University Over the Death in Action of Lieut. Vernon Beevor, a Former Student.
 The annual session of the Arts Concurus Iniquitatis et Virtutis was held on Saturday afternoon with Judge McDougall presiding. Some of the men came in anticipation of a rush, but as this event did not take place the sessions of the Court proceeded in a very orderly manner. There were a number of cases up, and some interesting legal battles were fought. There were no very serious cases dealt with, however, and only small fines were levied on offending members. One of the interesting precedents established by the Court was that where military and the common law of the concursus conflict, the military law has the precedence.

Many expressions of sorrow and sympathy were heard at the college when the news of the death of second Lieut. Vernon Beevor became known. The deceased was a well-known student at the university prior to his departure for England about a year ago. After graduating from the Kingston Collegiate Institute in 1915, he entered the Faculty of Applied Science. Shortly before the university session closed, Lieut. Beevor decided that his King and country needed him, and he proceeded to England, where he joined an English infantry regiment. His training in the Queen's University C. O. T. C. stood him in good stead, and he was one of the many who have received English commissions. He took a course in infantry training and was attached to an Essex regiment, with which he proceeded to France. His gallantry in action was rewarded several months ago by the Military Cross, a matter of considerable pride in the university that one of her sons should so distinguish himself in the battles of the Empire. His death is sincerely regretted both among the staff and students.

VINCENT FOWLER'S HOME ON PITTSBURG ROAD DESTROYED BY FIRE SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Big New Brick Home Now Only the Walls Standing—Nothing Was Saved.
 The new big brick home erected only three years ago by Vincent Fowler on the Pittsburg Road was completely destroyed by fire on Sunday afternoon, and now only portions of the walls are standing. The fire occurred while Mr. and Mrs. Fowler with their little daughter were out driving.

The home was the newest and one of the finest on the road between Kingston and Kingston Mills. It stood on the right hand side of the road and on rather a prominent piece of ground. It was beautifully finished both inside and outside.
 About four o'clock on Sunday afternoon some people were driving by and noticed the smoke. An entrance was attempted, but it was found impossible because of the volume of smoke. Edward Draper and the father of Mr. Fowler were called, and they secured more help over the telephone. The neighbors then formed a "bucket brigade" and securing water from the well did everything in their power to extinguish the flames.
 The fire had started so well, however, that not one article of furniture or anything else in the house could be saved, and finally the back and front walls fell in, leaving only a portion of the side walls and the chimney standing. The cost of the house alone was fully \$5,000, while the furnishings, etc., would greatly increase this amount. The outbuildings, including a splendid barn, were saved by the neighbors.
 The cause of the fire is unknown. It has been suggested that one of the stoves filled with gas and exploded.

ARTHUR FREE CAUGHT.
 Will Probably be Brought Here Within the Next Ten Days.
 In all probability Arthur Free, under arrest at Cape Vincent, N.Y., will be brought back within ten days. He has been arrested charged with illegally entering the United States, and to save time and expense the charge of murder at Selley's Bay will not be lodged against him until he reaches this side. He will be brought across the line on the first charge of illegally entering, which will be simply deportation. If the murder charge was pressed it would mean extradition and a long unwinding of official procedure.

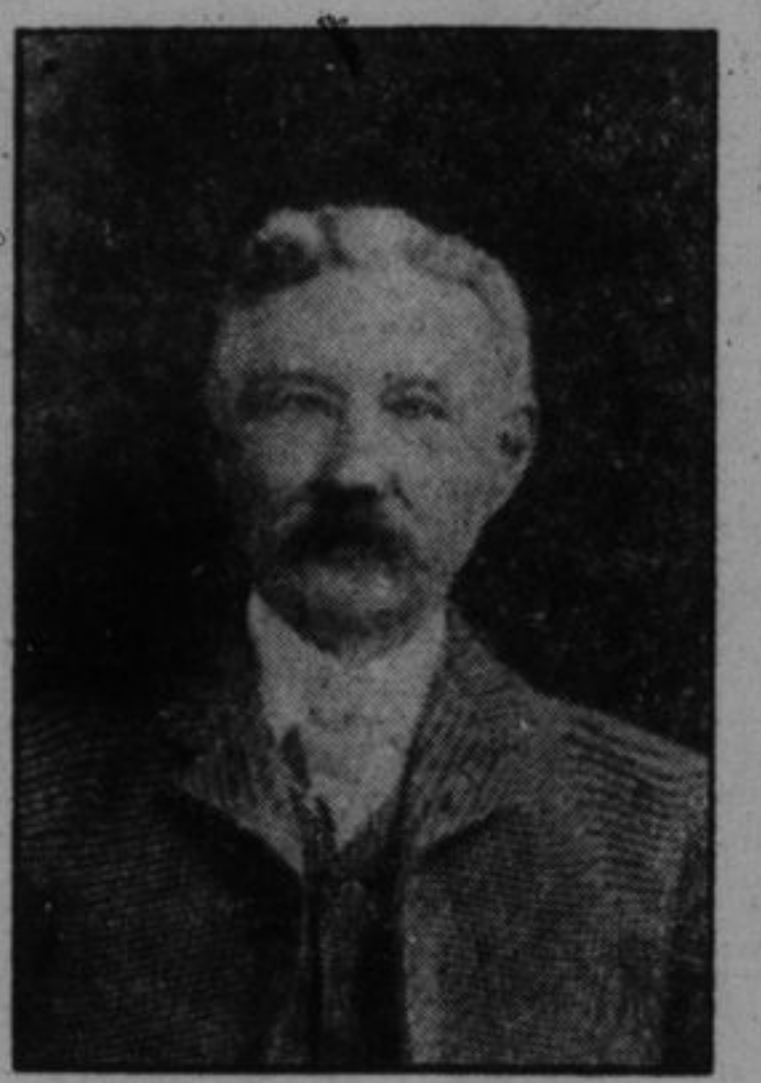
Charley Stewart Showed 'Em.

FOR ALL CONFISCATED LIQUOR TO GO TO INSTITUTIONS.

It is a Shame That All the "Strong Stuff" Should be Dumped Into the Sewers—Considerable Liquor Has Been Wasted.

There is one case of liquor, confiscated by the license inspector, which will not be used to flush the Kingston sewers, as a result of the action taken by Mayor Hughes, and it is the hope of citizens generally, that an order will be given by Chairman Flavell, of the Ontario License Board, to have all the liquor confiscated handed over to charitable institutions where good use can be made of it.
 Believing that it was a great waste to dump the "strong stuff" in the sewers, Mayor Hughes wrote Chairman Flavell, of the Ontario License Board, asking if the liquor seized by the police and Inspector McCammon could be handed over to some of the local institutions. He had special reference to a case of liquor confiscated by Inspector McCammon on Jan. 16th. As a result of the Mayor's request Inspector McCammon on Saturday received a letter from Chairman Flavell, ordering him to give the case of liquor in question over to the House For the Aged and Infirm. Liquor is required for medicinal purposes at this institution a great deal, and would be a benefit to the institutions.
 In years passed hundreds of gallons have been dumped into the sewer, when it might have been used at the local hospitals or one of the many charitable institutions in Kingston.
