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SHOULD USE IT FOR BUILDING BUT LOST FINAL GAME WITH VICTORIAS AT WINNIPEG.

Mrs. Plumtree, of Toronto, Speaks to Women's Canadian Club On "Ontario Women as Citizens"—Says Men and Women Should Work Together.

That the women of Ontario should use their vote for the best interests of the people, in the building up of a pure country, was the message that Mrs. Plumtree, of Toronto, gave at Convocation Hall on Monday evening, speaking under the auspices of the Women's Canadian Club.

Mrs. Macgillivray pointed out that it was just three months since the first meeting was held, when the woman suffrage campaign was launched in Kingston. As a result, a petition containing 4,200 names, had been secured for presentation to the legislature. The petition was not required, however, as the legislature had favored giving the vote to the women.

"We are no longer suffragettes," said Mrs. Macgillivray, amidst much applause, "but free and independent electors."

Mrs. Plumtree is a most fluent speaker, well versed with the many important problems of the day, and the address she delivered was a most inspiring one to the ladies who were engaged in Kingston to have the women gain the vote.

"Ontario Women as Citizens," was the title of her address, and she appealed to the women to do some hard thinking, so as to be in a position to vote for the very best measures. Now that the women were to be given the vote, they should not let it be said that they were indifferent.

While the legislation to give us the vote has not been passed yet," said the speaker, "I do not think that we are counting our chickens before they are hatched, for you know that we have two hens setting, on both sides of the house, and I guess we are pretty safe."

This remark of the speaker brought forth a ripple of laughter.

Continuing, Mrs. Plumtree said that the women started out with the approval of both sides of the house, so they were not tied to either party. Now they had the vote, the question was as to how to use it.

The speaker believed that it was the solemn duty of every woman to use the vote after careful thought and preparation. The women might join one of the established parties, form a women's party, or be the balance of power party. It was difficult to say just what would be the right thing to do.

What was right at one time, might be wrong another time. While the speaker did not see anything wrong in the party system in the main, she was not in favor of party abuse, and the patronage and spoils system. On both sides of the house there were things said and done which were not for the good of the country.

There was no doubt need of campaign funds, but there was no reason why they should be private. Such funds should be audited. And why should there be a patronage list? Positions should be filled by men with the best qualifications.

Some claimed that in following the Liberals or the Conservatives, the women would be doing harm, that they would be contaminated and soiled. Was it not time that we had a new idea of politics? No matter what party the object should be to serve the state, through the party. The proper men should be sent to Parliament—men with high ideals, who could withstand temptations. The good of the country should have first consideration.

"As to a women's party, we don't always agree among ourselves, and it wouldn't be long before we would have a division." (Laughter.)
