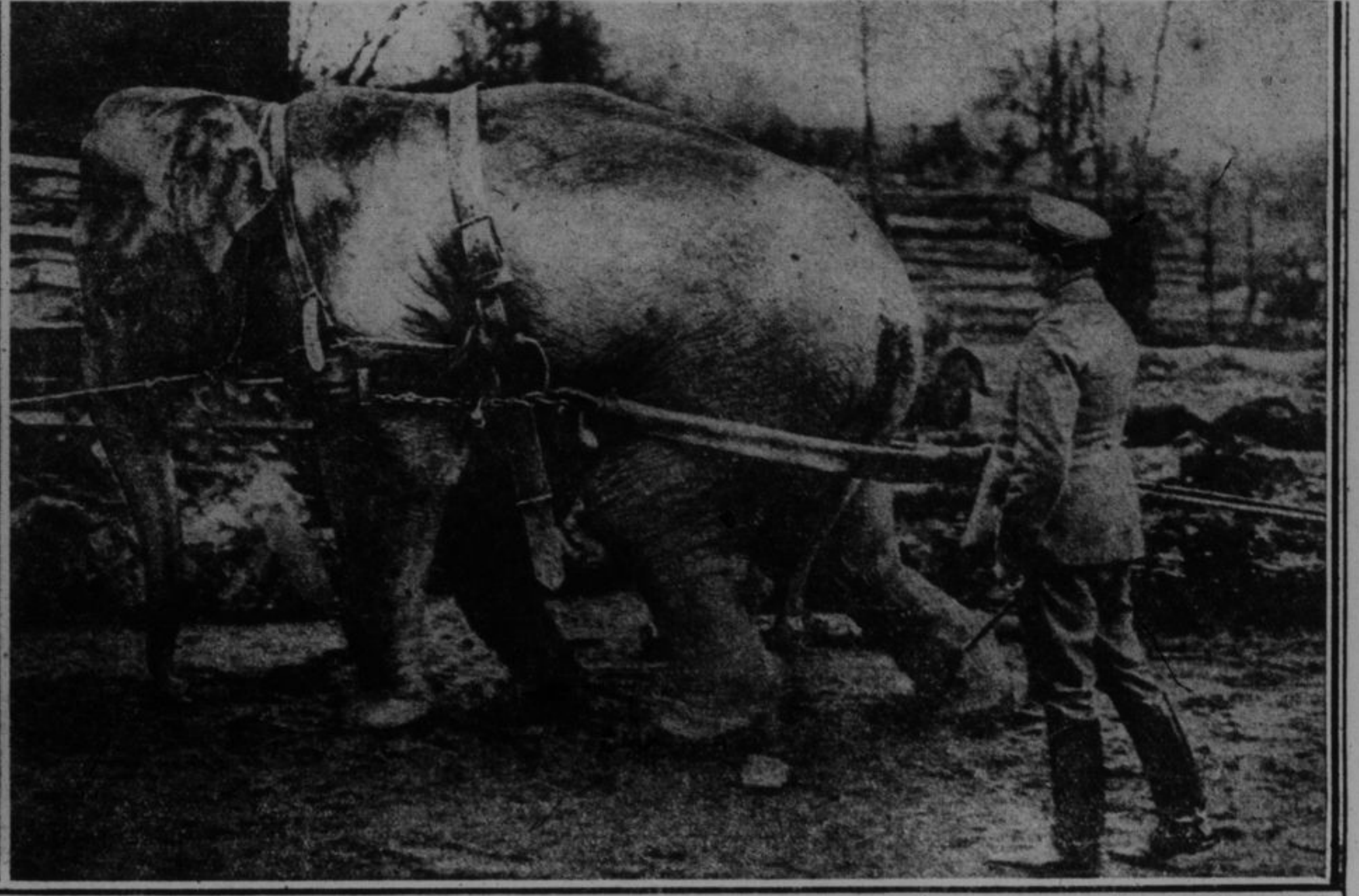

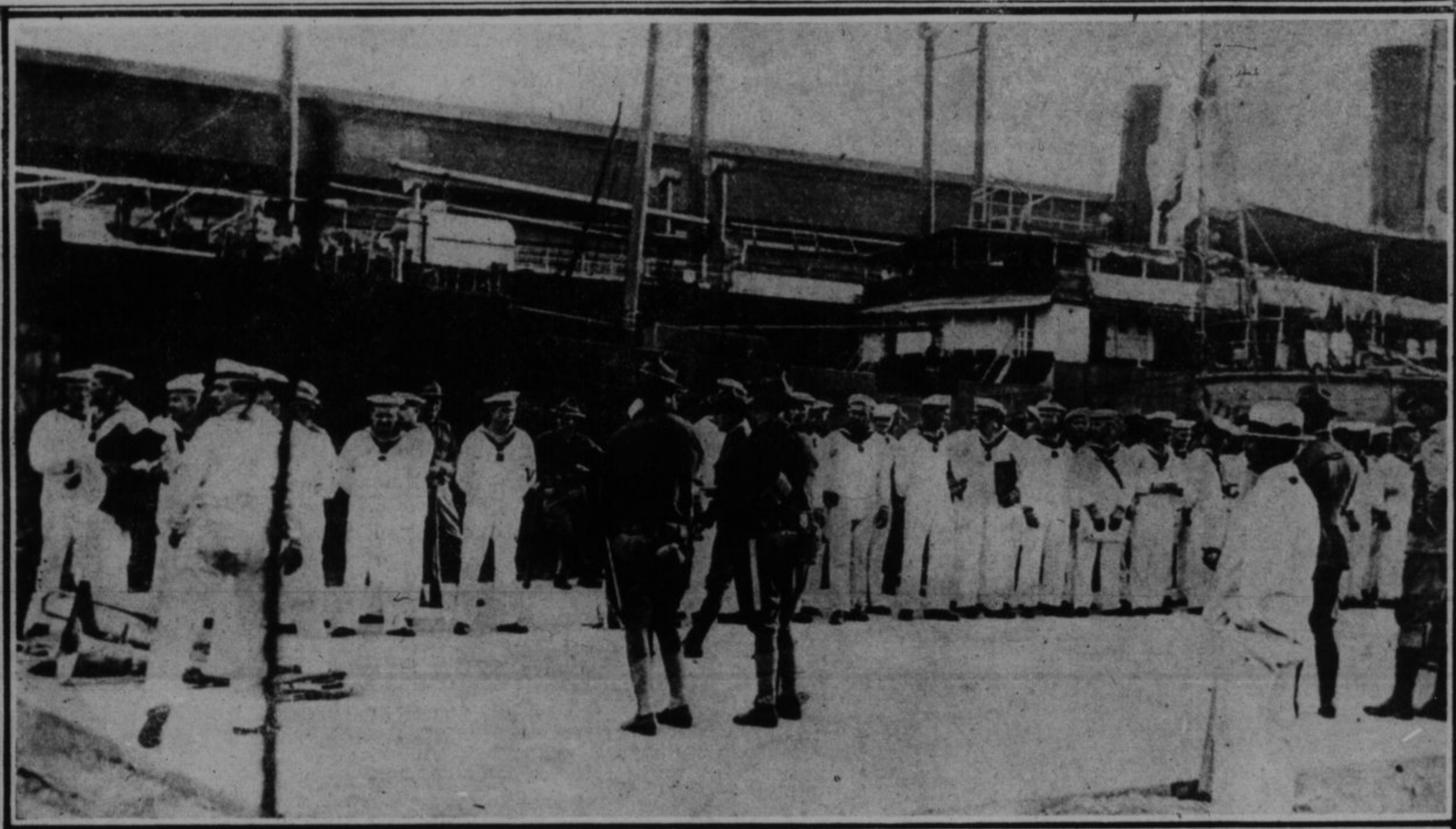

Crew of the German boat Cefer, interned at Honolulu, being assembled by U. S. soldiers prior to their march to camp under guard.



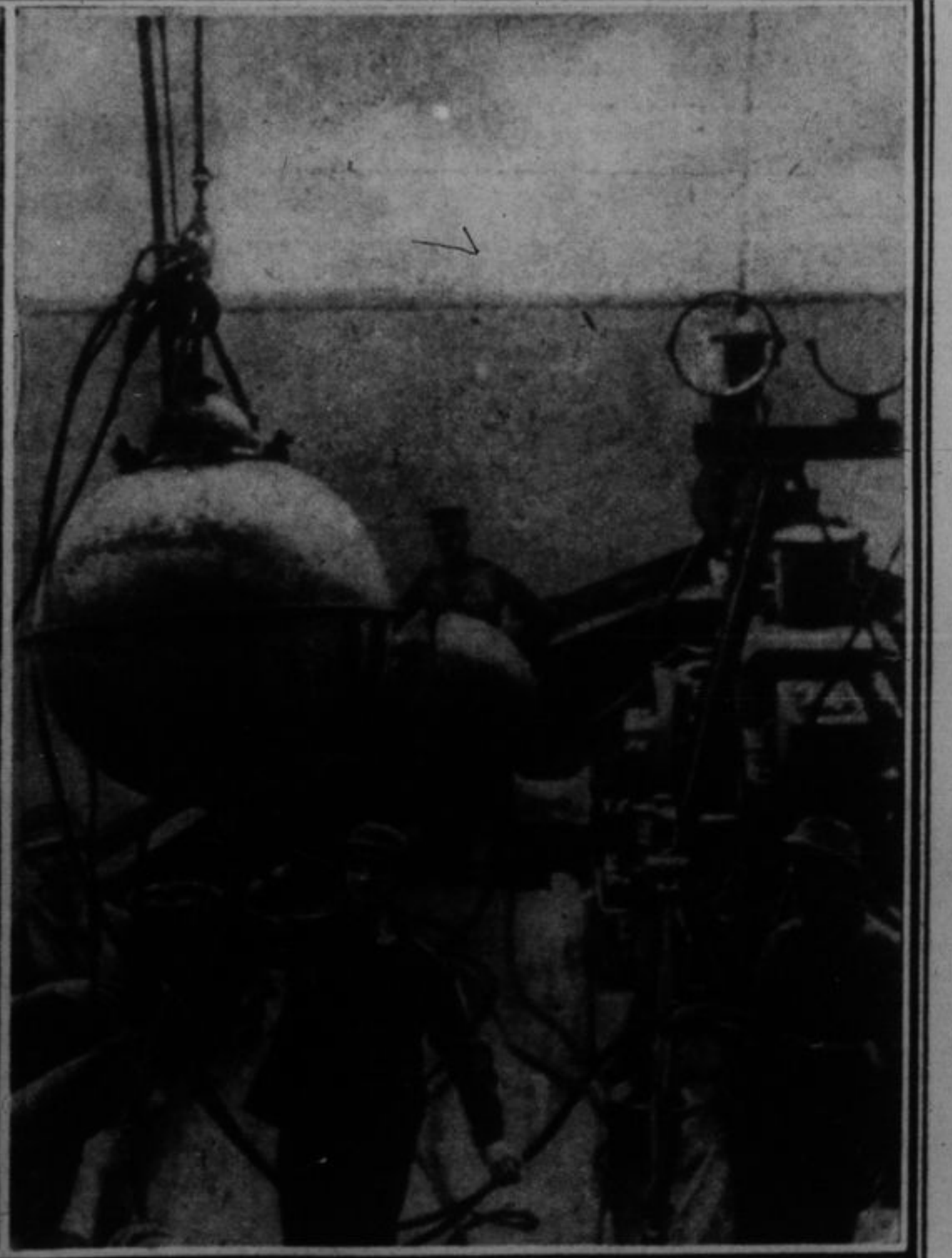
On account of shortage of food, Germany released 50,000 French civilian prisoners. Photo shows them assembled at the station waiting for instructions.
