REV. DR. DUNLOP WRITES

About How Quickly Japan Gets Canadian News.

The following is an extract from a letter from Rev. J. G. Dunlop, D.D., Japan, formerly of Kingston: "We watch war developments eagerly from day to day. Japan has some powerful newspaper companies now that are able to pay for columns of cable news daily from Europe and America. We have the gist of the news very promptly. Even the recent rioting at Kitchener, Ont., was printed here a few hours after it happened. We had a number of cables immediately about Sam Hughes' dismissal, and an Osaka city paper even was able to print a portrait of his successor, A. E. Kemp, soon as the appointment was made. Japan is a little bothered just now by China's proposal to follow the American lead—in regard to Germany; and that without asking the Japanese Government's advice. Japan would like to have plenipotentiary powers as China's one and only guardian. It's immensely interesting to be out here and to watch the developments—political, social, religious, moral—and have a small share in shaping them."

PRETTY STRONG STUFF

One Chinaman's Remark About Wine Seized by the Police.

A local Chinaman who examined the wine confiscated by the police in a Chinese shop on Wednesday night, remarked that it was pretty strong stuff, and that very little of it would put a man under the influence of liquor. The wine is still at the police station, but there has been no test made of it as yet. The Chinamen who had the wine are very much excited to know just what is going to happen.

PROBABLY TWO WEEKS.

Before Route to Cape Vincent Will be Opened For Vessels.

It was stated on Friday morning that it would probably be two weeks before the route to Cape Vincent would be open to vessels. It is reported that there is a great deal of ice down the river, and that it will take at least two weeks to clear so that the vessels can make the trip in safety.

CARRIED QUEEN'S HOSPITAL.

The torpedoing of the hospital ship Asturias is of interest to Kingstons and particularly to Queen's men who were with No. 5 Stationary Hospital (Queen's). When the hospital was first sent from England to Cairo the Asturias carried it to its eastern destination and for over a month was the home of the hospital. It also took two other hospitals to the island of Lemnos at the same time.

LIEUT. W. MCINTYRE RETURNING.

Lieut. William McIntyre, one of the best known officers of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, is returning to the city in about three weeks on sick leave. He left Kingston with the R. C. H. A. in August, 1914, going to Valenciennes and then overseas. After being at the front for two years he has been sick and is being allowed to come to Canada to recuperate.

Owen Reid, a well-known and highly respected resident of Belleville, whose home is on North Front street, died suddenly this morning at Orillia, where he had been visiting.

SUPPLEMENTARY ESTIMATES

Of Ontario Show Grants For Rockwood and Frontenac Roads.

The Ontario supplementary estimates show \$16,400 for Rockwood hospital as follows: Maintenance and repairs of buildings \$5,000; maintenance and repair of plants \$3,800; furniture and furnishings \$2,000; live stock, vehicles and farm implements \$2,100; miscellaneous services \$1,500; drainage of farm lands, \$2,000.

These grants are made to Frontenac county roads and bridges: Cole Creek bridge, Hinchinbrooks \$500; Fish Creek bridge, Hinchinbrooks, \$200; McLaren Creek bridge, Palmerston \$500; Mississippi bridge, Palmerston \$300; Salmon River drainage, Kennebec \$200; Abinger boundary road, Abinger and Clarendon townships, \$200; Myers Cave and Barrie road \$250; Lavant and Omphah road, \$100; Long Lake and Omphah road, \$100; Long Lake and Mountain Grove road, \$400; Omphah and Polger road, \$200; Rose Hill and Vennachar road, \$100; road running south from Shabot Lake, \$200; Vennachar and Mallory turn road, \$200.

BETTER HOTELS SINCE PROHIBITION CAME

W. S. Dingman Says the Hotelmen Are Keeping the Law Well.

"We have no reason to criticize the way in which the law is being observed by the hotel men throughout the province since the enforcement of the Ontario temperance act. In fact, we find better hotels today than before prohibition. Hotelmen who formerly depended upon the bar and directed their energies that way are now looking after the other ends of the hotel business. Of course, there are some things that we have yet to improve, but on the whole the act has reduced drunkenness and crime, and made better conditions in several respects," said W. S. Dingman, chairman of the Ontario License Commission, when questioned as to the effect generally on conditions throughout the province since September 16th last.
