SUMMER CARNIVAL IN YEAR 1921
Gananogue Journal Devotes Almost Complete Issue to Gigantic Scheme.

The residents of every place between Brockville and Kingston should be interested in a scheme which H. Dempster outlines in the latest issue of the Gananogue Journal. It is "a summer carnival at the Thousand Islands in the year 1921." The Journal has devoted a full issue to the plan, and carries special articles with such titles, "Property Values Would Greatly Increase," "Meeting on Wednesday, April 4th," "All Lines of Business With Merchants Would Boom." Under the heading, "To the People of Gananogue in Particular," the following questions are printed: "Would you like to see Gananogue with 2,000 residents? Would you like to see Gananogue do something that would be a development, that would assist the peaceful world after the climax is reached in Europe to absorb the reaction that must come?" The matter has been taken up with Francis King, president of the Kingston Board of Trade, and will likely become a district issue immediately.

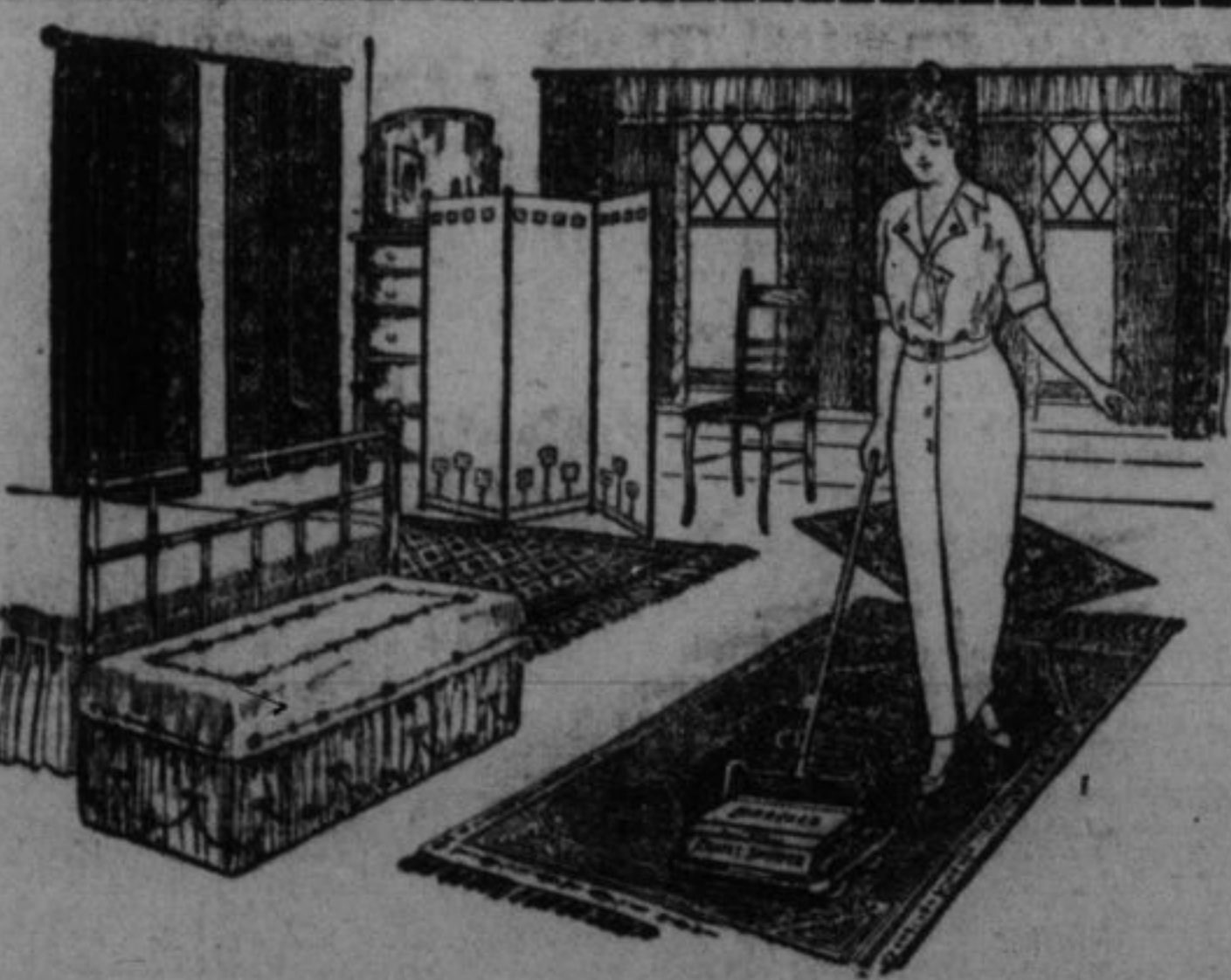
