GERMANS GOING FURTHER NORTH

Will Be Transferred Early Next Week to Kapuskasing Camp in New Ontario.

The German and Austrian prisoners of war at Fort Henry will be moved to Kapuskasing early next week and the final arrangements are being made for their transfer to the northern camp.

To move over 300 men from Fort Henry to New Ontario is a big undertaking but Lieut.-Col. H. E. Date and his staff are confident that every precaution will be made and that there will be no escapes. It is understood that a special train for the work will be used and as quietly as possible the band will come, to the entraining point to be loaded in and then without any unnecessary stops will go directly to the new camp.

Ben Isely, Swiss consular-general, is the Canadian representative of the prisoners and he was in the city on Saturday making an inspection and attending to official details of the transfer.
