TWO SHOTS WERE FIRED ARE BATHS NECESSARY?

ORDNANCE BUILDING GUARD, TRY TO STOP MARAUDERS.

Believed to Be Organized Attack on Men of the Special Service Company.
About 10:20 o'clock on Friday night, people in many parts of the city were surprised to hear two sharp reports of rifles in the hands of the guard on the Ordnance Building on King street near the cap barns. The excitement was intense and crowds were running this way and that running down "clues" as to the cause of the trouble.

Shortly before the time mentioned the sentry on guard at the Ordnance Building heard a sound made by someone behind an iron door of the building. He called "Halt" but two men ran out, and disobeying the command, ran along King street. He fired twice in an endeavor to stop them but they got away.

This is believed in official circles to be the same trouble that has come on five occasions to the guard at the water tower. It will be remembered that the 14th Regiment at first had this work. The Special Service Company was organized and men of that unit have since been on duty. While the 14th Regiment was there, there was no trouble but evidently in an effort to belittle the work of the men under Lieut. Munsie, an organized attempt has been made to frighten them from their work. The fallacy of this idea is shown, however, in the fact that several members of the company, without authority, have spent night after night with the intention of getting the marauders and now the enthusiasm in this case has become even more widespread.

Rich Men Ask to Be Taxed.
Washington, April 28.—A delegation of wealthy New Yorkers astonished the Government by appearing before the Ways and Means Committee with the request that the Government confiscate every man's income in excess of \$100,000 per year. They presented figures showing that in 1915 there were 3,824 persons in the United States with incomes in excess of one hundred thousand dollars. With the increase in profits and incomes since 1915 the Government could obtain one billion and a half for war purposes from taxes on incomes.

Conductor Goes to Jail.
Hamilton, April 28.—Lewis Barry, G.T.R. conductor, was given two months in jail for allowing his train to run into a street car, injuring eleven people.
