Table at Little Cost. One way to reduce the cost of food for the family, says a specialist from the United States Department of Ag-

riculture, is to use more corn meal. Corn meal at present prices bought at retail stores costs about half as much per pound as white flour, onethird as much as rolled oats and about one-half as much as broken rice. That is, it costs much less per pound than any of the other popular cereal foods.

Even the bolted corn meal, usually sold, from which the germ of the grain has been removed to make the meal keep longer, has a food value which compares favorably with that of wheat flour. It does not supply quite as much nortein or mineral matter for the building of the tissues of the body, but on the other hand it gives more fat and starch, pound for pound, and its value as fuel for the body is fully as high.

The old-fashioned unbolted corn meal made from whole grain, which can often be obtained by the farmer and can also be purchased in the markets, contains more of the tissuebuilding material and has what many consider evena better flavor than the bolted meal and is much liked for making some forms of corn bread, Any family in the country can

have the best of corn meal by grinding it at home in a hand grist mill. The city man can buy corn by the bushel at the grain store. He can grind it coarse or fine to suit the family and in quantities to last a week-or more at a time or longer. Prices of hand mills of substantial make run from \$2,50 to \$5. A small hand mill can be had as low as \$1.50, though this sort would be


