## URGED ALL YOUNG PEOPLE

TO AID IN THE GREATER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN.

Fr. Hanley Read Premier's Proclamation in St. Mary's Cathedral—Tells What the Parish Has Done For the War.

Palm Sunday was celebrated in St. Mary's Cathedral on Sunday by the Archbishop blessing and distributing the palms. He was assisted by Fr. Hanley and Fr. Corrigan. Fr. Meagher was master of ceremonies, Fr. Halligan was in charge of the sanctuary choir. High mass was celebrated by Fr. Mea.

At all the masses Fr. Hanley read the Premier's proclamation and the appeal being made by the Ontario Organization of Resources Committee. He referred to the fact that St. Mary's parish had contributed 400 men to the overseas forces, had given generously to the Red Cross Society and to similar objects, and this latest appeal should be given the same generous response. He urged the people to do what they could for greater production and lend their assistance in the campaign now on. Fr. Hanley advised the young men of the parish, who were idle, or had nothing much to do, and also students at the close of the schools, to secure work with the farmers during the summer months, as men were scarce and food products could not well be cultivated unless labor was available.

### EXCELLENT MUSICAL COMEDY

"The Girl Who Smiles," at the Grand on Saturday.

Large audiences enjoyed the production of the French musical comedy, "The Girl Who Smiles," at the Grand on Saturday afternoon and evening. This production follows more closely the lines of the real musical comedy than most so-called productions, the plot being consistently carried out. Clare Thrapp, Leland Stearns, Tom Collins, Willis Claire and Geraldine Malone give admirable support.

## ROMANCE IN SLAV NAMES.

Meanings Connected With Joy, Victory, and Fame.

Few Canadians know there is romance in the strange-sounding Russian names brought to our notice by the war.

It is interesting, in the first place, to note how largely names signifying "hope," "victory," "fame," "joy" figure in Russian, Polish, and Slavonic nomenclature, while "glory" is capable of forming an entire class by itself. All of which evidences that spirit of fiery patriotism which burns in every Slav breast, and has caused this conflict to be regarded as a "holy war."

The czar's name, Nicholas (which appears in his own country as Nikolai, or Nikalo), bears the auspicious meaning of "victory of the old Greek word nikos (victory)."

Another beautiful Russian name is Anikta, which means, literally, "without victory"; hence, "unconquered."

Few would recognize our familiar John under the poetic Ivan, with the feminine Ivanna and Ivanica, all of which mean "grace of the Lord."

Our Elizabeth appears as Ekisavetta (oath of God), and Kate is transformed into Katarina of the musical Katinka.

Jebronisa (mirth), Jelica (light) and Jevva (life) are surely a happy trio from which to christen a baby girl.

Here are just a few of the countless "glory" names: Stanislav (camp glory), Mitrofan (tre glory), Misilav (avenging glory), Lavoslav (lion glory), Vatroslav (hero glory), Venecoslav, as the true spelling is (glorious glory); Slavomir (glorious friend), Slavov (glorious peace), and Slavovje (glorious love), or the three beautiful feminine, Eudoxia (happy glory), Micolav (peace glory), and Valeska (ruling glory).

In all of these (except Eudoxia, which is used in its Greek form) we shall see that "Slav" signifies "Glory"; hence the pride of the Slavonic race in their title.

"Fame" belongs to Valdemar (powerful fame), Valdimir (ruling the world), Kurik (famed rule), and Ulrika (noble rule).

One of the prettiest groups of Russian names is that which corresponds to our "Dorothy" set, and comprises Fedor, Feodor, Ferodors, and Feodosia, all meaning "God's gift"; while Theodora and Theodosia denote "Divine gift." "Joy" is the meaning of the following: Radak, Radan, Radko, and Radman, and form ideal names for little Russian boys. Dadmil (joyful love) and Radivo (joyful war) supply two others, while the pretty Radinka (joyful peace) will surely be used greatly when that glad day comes!

Paul, meaning "little," has a whole host of variations, of which the best known are Pavla, Pavola, and Pavlina.

"Peter" denotes "a stone" or "rock" and supplies the basis of the name Petrograd (stone city, or more nearly, rock fortress), which the czar has substituted for the former St. Petersburg, a title that was really incorrect, inasmuch as Russia's capital has no connection with St. Peter, but was called after Peter the Great, the Russian Emperor.

### Golf.

The game of golf, according to the new Encyclopaedia Britannica, goes back at least five centuries, having been portrayed by early Dutch painters. One of the pictures in a Dutch illuminated Book of Hours, now in the British Museum, is a painting of three men putting at a hole in the turf as in modern golf. Although the Dutchmen did play and paint golf, they did not write about it, so there are no records describing the game.

Just when Scotland took up golf is unknown, but by 1457 it was already so popular, says the Britannica, that it interfered with the more important pursuit of archery. In May, 1501, an Act of the Scottish Parliament was passed, forbidding this sport: "Futeball and golfe forbidden. Item, it is staut and ordainit that in na place of the realm there be usit futeball, golfe, or other ilk unprofitable sports."

It is rather curious that this is an edict of King James IV., who later became much attached to the practice of the "unprofitable sport"—not only he but his daughter, Mary Stuart.

England's Importance.

At the moment Germany suggests peace we see the control of the policy and purposes of her three great opponents passing into hands determined to carry on the war, and with all three of her great foes reorganizing their ministries and replacing their generals with the plain purpose to push the campaign and with not the smallest suggestion that peace is expected or desired on any but terms that only a victor can dictate. To men the world over, France, and Russia are the strongest reasons why the German proposals will fail to end the war, rather, I think they will accelerate the pace of the fighting, when spring comes, and it is possible to move in France and Belgium again. And henceforth the part that Britain will play in the coalition against Germany will increase steadily. In my judgment, it may become commanding, if, as many Englishmen believe, Great Britain has found in Lloyd George another Pitt.—From "Peace, Politics, and War—a Marvelous Mouth," by Frank H. Simonds.

The reference was to the quotation, "Perchance, my dog will bowl."

## DESERTION IS CHARGED

BUT CLAIMED THAT JOHN BURGEON GAVE HIMSELF UP.

During the Time the Governor-General Allowed in His Proclamation—Case Adjournd For a Day to Secure Evidence.

The first case of desertion to come before the Police Court was heard on Monday morning by Magistrate Farrell.

There have been quite a list of cases of this kind before the court, Magistrate, but the city Police Court has been free of them.

John Burgeon, a well-built young man, with the make-up of a good soldier, was the person charged. A. B. Cunningham appeared for him and explained to the Magistrate that the accused had given himself up under the governor-general's proclamation, and on this account, asked that the charge be dropped. Burgeon signed up with "B" Battery, and is quite willing to go to the front with any unit.

It appears that Burgeon was in Detroit when the governor-general issued his proclamation about giving a chance to all deserters who gave themselves up within a specified time. Burgeon gave himself up on the second last day of the time allowance, and has been held at the barracks here since Feb. 27th. Just why he has been held so long without a charge being made against him was not stated, but it appears that certain documents concerning the case went overseas with the battery.

Magistrate Farrell remanded the case for a day, in order that Mr. Cunningham might have an opportunity of presenting evidence that is required by the court.

He would use the large flower beds in the parks, which have not yet been planted, and sow in them various vegetables for the instruction of the public. Superintendent Phillips is an experienced grower, and he could show the people something worth while. Ald. Kent, chairman of the parks committee, is also a member of the City Council Greater Production Committee, and no doubt he will consider Ald. Nickle's suggestion.

Loew's Theatre for Kingston.

In spite of rumors to the contrary, the Whig is informed that arrangements for the construction of the Loew's Theatre for Kingston are being quietly proceeded with by those interested. It is practically assured that the theatre will be erected here, and it will not be many months before same is in active operation. The great financial success of the chain of Loew's theatres is well known. The Toronto Loew's is said to be earning from \$4,000 to \$5,000 net profits weekly at the present time. The stock was last week paying 7 per cent, and is placed on a 7 per cent basis. A Loew's theatre is to be erected in Hamilton shortly.

Broke Limb for Second Time.

Mrs. H. W. Watt, 98 Frontenac street, had the misfortune to break her leg for the second time within a few weeks. Mrs. Watt recently left the General Hospital, where a previous accident to the limb necessitated an operation. In walking up the steps to her home she slipped and fractured it for the second time, and she is now confined to her house.

### BACK TO THE LAND AGAIN

CALL GIVEN TO RETIRED FARMERS IN KINGSTON.

Resources Committee Appeals to Them to Lend Helping Hand in the Time of the Country's Great Need.

In connection with the campaign which is being carried on for increased production, the call is made for retired farmers to go back to the land.

Dr. Albert H. Abbott, secretary of the Resources committee, has written a circular letter, emphasizing the need of prompt action for the assistance of the farmers. He says that the call of the Empire for more food is urgent, but that Ontario farmers cannot respond unless labor is available for seeding, which will commence early in April. Immediate action is imperative if assistance is to be given.

Dr. Abbott calls for retired farmers and others in the Kingston district to co-operate with the Board of Trade and other organizations interested.

Retired farmers in Kingston will now have a chance to do their "bit."

### THE MARKETS IN BRIEF

The Prices of Sugar and Flour Rose Last Week.

Two increases have taken place during the week which mean much to the grocery trade, namely, on sugar the advance amounted to 40c per hundred and on flour 30c per barrel. The advance in sugar was occasioned through recent high prices which Canadian refiners were forced to pay for raw sugars. Flour on the other hand returned to the point reached in the face of a continued firmness and high price for wheat.

Provisions were firm during the week with advances recorded in a number of lines of cooked and smoked meats. Live hogs were quoted at higher prices than those generally prevailing last week. Eggs moved downward during the week, due to heavier production on Canadian farms. The Canadian market is now almost entirely independent of the American source of supply. With continued good weather prices are expected to decline still further. Lobster is another of the commodities in which a decline has been registered. This has been occasioned through the shutting off of the British market to the packers of the Maritime Provinces. New Zealand onions came into the Ontario market for the first time, owing to the scarcity of other onions, and are commanding a high price. Potatoes held steady in price, but there is a disposition towards easier prices.

The recent British embargo on exports has cut off supplies of many staple lines, which in the past have been steady sellers in this market. Packet teas are very firm in price. Importers of teas have been unable to get promise of teas for shipment from Colombo or Calcutta. Tea can be bought at these points, but grow-
