781 RECRUITS ENLISTED

MILITARY DISTRICT NO. 3 DOUBLES PREVIOUS RETURN

The Local Units Show up Well—Two-Thirds of 10,000 Gen. Hemming Asked For Has Been Secured.

Brig-Gen. T. D. R. Hemming, G. O. C., announced last November that he was asking the officers and men in this district to secure 10,000 recruits before the summer camp of 1917 opened. To date there have been 6,774 of that number secured. This district has already enlisted 46,615 recruits since the war broke out.

For the last two weeks in March there were 781 recruits enlisted in this district—nearly double the number enlisted in the previous two weeks.

Kingston units secured these recruits: 72nd Battery, 15; 73rd Battery, 22; 74th Battery, 10; 75th Battery, 5; 5th D.A.C., 22; 253rd Battalion, 38; C.O.S.C., 29; C.O.D.C., 2; Cyclists 5; draft A.M.C., 3.

MILITARY CIRCLES.

Captain R. Ross Algire, Cornwall, received word advising him to report at the Army Medical Corps School, Kingston, where he will remain for a short time prior to going overseas. Capt. Algire has received his majority, the appointment dating from March 16th.

Lt. George R. Grange, who has been divisional transport officer here for the past six months, has applied through the Naval Department at Ottawa for transfer to the Royal Naval Flying Corps.

Major G. A. Ferguson, Saskatoon, has been appointed acting quartermaster-general at Shorncliffe. Major Ferguson is a son of Alexander Ferguson, South Branch, near Cornwall.

Calvin Myles, son of W. N. Myles, Deseronto, has won a distinguished conduct medal for bravery on the field. During a raid he carried a wounded officer from the enemy trench a considerable distance under heavy fire and later again rejoined his party and was wounded.

A goodly number of soldiers attended the social concert given at the military Y.M.C.A. hall Saturday evening. In addition to the playing of games an entertaining programme was given. Miss Phyllis Devlin, accompanied by Miss Devlin, sang some popular selections. Miss Ethel M. Suchland also contributed some excellent vocal selections. Miss Parrot, elocutionist, in her impressive rendering of some of Robert Service's noted patriotic sketches, was very entertaining. Pte. Kelly held the attention of everybody by his recital of one of Rudyard Kipling's famous selections. At the close of the programme the men were served with refreshments by a committee of ladies. The pleasant evening closed with the men gathering around the piano, where Mrs. Stroyer led them in a good old-time sing-song.

The social hour at the military Y. M. C. A. Sunday evening attracted a large number of soldiers and friends. In every way the hour was most enjoyable and profitable. It was one of the best Sunday evening social hours yet conducted at the military "Y." The meeting was in charge of S. H. Greenslade, secretary, and opened with an illustrated song service.
