

Dr. A. C. Johnston, of Humboldt, Sask., who has been visiting in the city, is one of the few men now in Saskatchewan who have returned his experiences last evening when asked for a recital of accomplishments of the British troops. Dr. Johnston enlisted from Saskatchewan in September, 1915, with the R.A.M. C. and for a year served with the British troops in Mestopotamia. He was invalided home after contracting enteric fever, and has now come back to practice his profession.

On arriving in England, Dr. Johnston was detailed to serve in the east and was given charge of the medical department of a British base hospital at Basra on the Tigris, near the Persian gulf.

The two incidents, which stand out prominently during his time of service, were the receiving of the messige from General Town the death of Sir Victor Ho heatstroke while serving in Mesopo-
